Mr. Douglas (Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands): Is it not the Prime Minister's intention to reconstitute this special planning secretariat, is he going to name any agency to co-ordinate the efforts of his ministers in respect of this war on poverty program and, if so, what agency?

Mr. Trudeau: Mr. Speaker, we have at least two cabinet committees co-ordinating the economic and regional development aspects of this matter.
