AMOUNT OF GOVERNMENT FUNDING

Mr. George Baker (Gander—Twillingate): Mr. Speaker, the Department of Regional Industrial Expansion said recently that multi millions of dollars have been removed from Atlantic Canada since this Government took office. There have been cuts in transfer payments. There have been cuts in programs. The Fisheries Improvement Loans Program is about to end. It will finish at the end of this month after 33 years in Atlantic Canada, and the Minister of Fisheries and Oceans is scared to announce it.

I ask the Prime Minister will the amount of money which will be put into this new program at least match what has been removed by this very Government in the past two years? Will that amount of money be matched? If it will not be, how can the Government have the audacity to promise Canadians over and over that this will address the regional disparity problems of eastern Canada? You can't eat promises. Where is the beef?

Right Hon. Brian Mulroney (**Prime Minister**): Mr. Speaker, I am delighted to hear that the Hon. Member is going to be in St. John's on Saturday. I want him to know that he has my vote.

Through you, Mr. Speaker, my question to the Prime Minister asks whether he is prepared to meet with the mayors of 14 municipalities in Canada who want to ask him to reconsider federal funding or federal participation in rebuilding our aging cities. Will he meet with those mayors?

Hon. Michael Wilson (Minister of Finance): Mr. Speaker, I should point out to the Hon. Member that I have personally met with representatives from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities on a number of occasions over the past two and a half years where this matter has come up. I have been very clear with them as to the position of the Government. We are in a position of major fiscal restraint. What the municipalities are asking us to do is to share with the provinces and municipalities in programs which are essentially the responsibility of the municipalities and the provinces.

I want to take great exception to a report in the paper the other day which said the Government was reneging on promises I have made. I have never made those promises. I have been quite up front in telling the municipalities exactly where we stood as a Government. Unfortunately, this is something that we just cannot afford at this point.
