FINAL REPORT OF WORLD COMMISSION ON ENVIRONMENT AND DEVELOPMENT

Mr. Jim Fulton (Skeena): Mr. Speaker, on Saturday, June 3, there will a world-wide five-hour television broadcast on our common future. It will deal with issues of global concern such as famine, deforestation, ozone depletion, global warming, famine, flooding, and drought. The theme of the broadcast is the final report of the World Commission on Environment and Development.
