ly proper to detain it in our Hands while the Contest for the Spanish Crown remained undetermined. But I was ever of Opinion it would have been our Interest, as a trading Nation, to have had it restored to Philip V. on the Conclusion of that general War. We might have had any commercial Concessions we would, any Advantages, over other trading Nations, we could wish for, if that Fortress had been yielded to Spain by the Treaty of Utrecht.

But as much as it would have been for the Benefit of the Nation to barter away Gibraltar in Exchange for folid and fubftantial Advantages in Trade, it might have been dangerous for the then Ministry even to make the Proposal, confidering how impetuously the Current of the national Prejudice ran in Favour of the Detention of the Conquest.

Befides, feeing the domestic Opposition Lord Treasurer Oxford met with in perfecting the Work of Peace, he might very well be excused fuffering himself to be carried away with the Tide of *Prejudice*, and even to avail himself of the
