OFFICIALLY DEAD HERO GETS HONORS

Franco-Frussian War Veteran Could Not Claim Medal as He Was Dead.

LONDON, Aug. 30 -The military medal for gallantry at Gravelotte during the Franco-Prussian War of 1870 has fust been received by M. August in Jegourel.

When his regiment rushed with bayonets on a strong force of German cavalry Jegourel received a bullet in his leg. He was ordered to go to the ambulence, but refused. The injured man got up and was shot by a second bullet. He was registered as killed on the roll of the regiment. Jegourel using his broken rifle as a crutch made for the ambulance but once more was hit, this time by a shell splinter, and next day woke up in a German military hospital.

When he applied to the minister of war for the military medal he was informed that he was dead killed at Gravelotte by a Prussian bullet. The authorities, after forty-three years, have at length been convinced so that the Gravelotte hero is to have his medal. ing the Franco-Prussian War of 1870
