WHERE DID MONEY GO? POLICE STILL BAFLED

Canadian Express Company Offers Reward of \$500—Many Buildings to Be Erected.

HAMILTON, Oct. 1.—(Special.)—No further arrests have been made in the Canadian Express robbery case, and the startling developments promised in the matter have so far failed to materialize.

The Canadian Express Company has offered a reward of \$500 for information leading to the recovery of the stolen money or the conviction of the robbers.

George H. Kenough, the night clerk for the company, who is accused of the theft, and John W. Hughes, who was arrested on a charge of vagrancy, and who was suspected of complicity in the affair, were remanded for eight days when they appeared in police court on Saturday.

PARNELL STATUE UNVEILED

John Redmond Prophesies Opening of Irish Parliament Within Two Years. DUBLIN, Oct. 1.—The bronze statue of Parnell, one of the finest achievements of the great sculptor Augustus St. Gaudens, which has been erected largely thru subscriptions by American admirers, was unveiled to-day by John E. Redmond, leader of the Irish parliamentary party.

Richard Croker, who lent his support to the project, accompanied Mr. Redmond thru the day's proceedings, and the young and old chiefs received a stirring ovation, which brought smiles to their faces.
