AT 20, SUICIDES IN CELL

IN PENAL INSTITUTION

Why One Poor Mortal Found Himself "No Good on Earth, But Perhaps in Hell."

Chicago, Feb. 4.—Rocco Bell, twice an inmate of the Pontiac reformatory, has made good his threat to commit suicide if returned to jail. He hung himself in a cell at the county jail early yesterday morning. The boy was 20 years old, but was an habitual criminal and had spent half of his life in penal institutions.

"You give me just one more chance, and maybe I can get into the army and get away from my associates in Chicago. If I have to go back to the Pontiac reformatory, I will surely commit suicide," said Bell when he was arrested and taken to the Chicago-avenue station a week ago. He repeated this threat when being given a hearing on a charge of robbery in Justice Mayer's court a day later.

When he was taken to the county jail Jailer Whitman was warned of the boy's threat by Lieut. Larkin of the Chicago-avenue police station. This guard was ordered to keep a close watch on him, but during the temporary absence of the guard, on the morning he tore the sheets of his cot into shreds, made a rope of them, fastened one end to the wall and the other to his neck, and strangled himself.
