



HAMILTON HAPPENINGS HAMILTON ASKS TERMS MAY USE NIAGARA POWER

Several Brilliant Society Functions Last Night—Thirteenth to Go to Buffalo.

Hamilton, April 5.—The board of works decided this evening to ask out at what terms it can secure power from the hydro-electric power commission for street lighting and other civic purposes.

It was agreed that this information should be secured, and that afterwards private power users should be asked to sign provisional contracts for government power.

New steps up the mountain at Garth street will be built. The G.T.R. notified the board that it wanted permission to lay two new tracks, one on each side of its main line from about Wellington-street to the eastern limits of the city.

The Metropolitan Paving Brick Company got the contract for bricks at in an amended tender for \$25,000. It was stated that the street railway will be the best of the tracks taken up on East King-street to make a new road on Herkimer-street, between Queen and Locke-streets.

The House of Refuge committee this afternoon approved of plans for the new \$30,000 Home for Incurables. A central heating plant will be installed, and the new building, containing 120 beds, will be situated on the corner of Main-street and Elgin-street.

THE TWO CENT FARE BILL KEEPS RAILROADS BUSY

Nebraska Lines Began Refusals But Were Brought to Time—Put Back Fast Trains.

Lincoln, Neb., April 6.—As soon as the Nebraska legislation passed the two-cent fare bill every railroad in the state began talking of retrenchment and revenge. The Union Pacific ordered work stopped on its near million-dollar headquarters building, took off two of its finest and fastest trains and stopped work on half a dozen improvements and out of its Burlington followed suit. Rock Island blustered about taking off trains because the receipts had been cut.

Just a Blind. "It's simply a blind to attract attention to the passenger fares and make the public forget the enormous freight rates charged in the state," was the expressed opinion on all sides in the legislature.

Then the legislature got busy again and began passing every railroad reform bill which had been introduced. This was an awful jolt to Harriman and others.

Crowded the Trains. The wall of the railroad managers began to die out. After the passage of the two-cent fare bill the trains were crowded to the limit. The Union Pacific announced that its two fast trains would be put back at once; double-tracking from Omaha westward went on with a stop; the Rock Island had announced that traffic had increased so that a new train from Chicago to Denver would be put on; the Burlington kept its trains running with people standing in the aisles; the Northwestern did not make the threatened changes in its trains; the Missouri Pacific, which never ran but two trains, began to have its coaches filled with passengers, instead of running almost empty, as they had been doing for years.

The railroad bluff had been called and the bluff was over. The service on all the lines is better than ever since the magnates have learned that the best way to stop the "reform legislation craze" is to keep the public in a good humor by giving it the best that is to be had.

Men Are Queer. "Wouldn't there be a roar when men went home to their meals if they had to climb up on a high stool in front of a table on which there was no cloth and eat their meals in this fashion? Yet says The Eureka (Kansas) Messenger, a majority of men when they go to a restaurant to eat, will pick out the highest stool and foodboard with no cloth on it in preference to a comfortable chair with a cloth-covered table. REBUILDING SAN FRANCISCO. The Greatest Area of Reconstruction The World Has Ever Seen.

San Francisco, April 6.—Something like seventy-five to eighty-five vessels are said to be now afloat with cargoes of building material for the rebuilding of San Francisco. Cement and structural steel compose the bulk of these cargoes. There are likewise large quantities of pressed brick, lime and terra-cotta distributed among these cargoes.

The tonnage of these vessels varies from 1000 tons to 5000 tons, with a total of about 300,000 tons. These vessels come from all parts of the world. Twenty vessels alone hail from Australia, loaded with cement; others from England, France, Japan, Italy, Germany, Australia. Vessels from American Atlantic ports make up a portion of this large fleet.

Many contracts for large reinforced concrete buildings have been let. As yet few buildings have commenced, on account of the scarcity of cement and steel. The arrival of the fleet is therefore anxiously awaited, when San Francisco will witness the greatest area of building construction the world has ever seen.

The Title of "Doctor." Every person practicing medicine under a legal qualification is in the

general view a "doctor," and to deny such a person the right to this title (says The Hospital) carries the implication that in some respect his professional position is defective. The qualification to practice, possibly of all qualified practitioners have one and the same legal basis, tho' the differences in specific designations tend to imply differences in value and kind. Admission to the official register may take place thru many portals, but once secured it carries the same consequences for all. The university graduate would, of course, still enjoy his sole right to the use of his degree (M.D.), but no practitioner would be denied the use of the term which the public interprets as the equivalent of a legal qualification to practice. Possibly both those who advocate, and those who oppose this suggestion attach undue importance to it. In practice the public has a full opportunity to estimate the general worth and capacity of individuals practitioners and technical details in regard to qualification are of essentially minor importance. Particular titles and designations will certainly not retain, even if they attract confidence unless there is something more substantial to support them.

COMBATED ON THE STAGE. Aristocratic Women in Rome Expose White Slave Traffic.

Rome, April 6.—With the consent of the Italian government and under the special patronage of a committee of ladies of the Roman aristocracy a movement has been set on foot in Rome for combating the growth of the white slave traffic by stage plays.

The experiment was initiated in the performance of a powerful five-act melodrama, by Signor Giuseppe Parini, called "The White Slaves." The plot unfolds a sad story of wives and violence used to ensnare with the offer of a remunerative post as governess in a wealthy family at Buenos Ayres a beautiful Italian girl just bereaved of her mother. The author's thesis is that the first fall is either irreparable in its consequences or else inclines the woman to seek refuge from her shame and misery in death.

The theatre was crowded to its utmost capacity, all the boxes and stalls being thronged with prominent citizens of either sex. The author received enthusiastic recalls before the curtain, and an effective verse prologue setting forth the moral of the play was recited by Gabriellina d'Annunzio, a son of the famous poet.

MUST SEW UP POCKET S. Soldiers Threaten Mutiny if Order is Enforced.

London, April 6.—Mutiny is threatened in the British army, unless the regimental order requiring all soldiers to sew up their pockets is withdrawn. A regimental order was issued last week which required officers commanding companies to report not later than March 25 that all trousers pockets of non-commissioned officers and men under command had been sewn up or removed, and that the order to entail a regimental entry on the conduct of any non-commissioned officer or man concerned. A petition asking for the withdrawal of the order is presented to the secretary of the war. Soldiers state openly they will not stand for such a foolish and inconvenient a regulation.


