OPENING CEREMONIES
OF MEDICAL FACULTY

Dr. Playfair McMurrich Addresses
Students on the Way to
Succeed.

The faculty of medicine session opened
last night at the university with a
lecture by Dr. Playfair McMurrich,
professor of anatomy, in convocation
hall, on "The history and study of
anatomy from the dark ages down to
the present era."

He told the students that their suc-
cess in the field of physics depended
on the keenness of their observation,
practical knowledge, independence of
thought, and thoroughness of study. If
they followed out these four points
in their studies there was nothing to
prevent every man from being a lead-
ing light in their honorable profes-
sion.

The hall was well filled when Presi-
dent Falconer, who was supported by
the Hon. Dr. Pyne, the members of
the senate, and the board of govern-
ors, rose to introduce the professor.
He said he was glad that one of his
first duties was to welcome such a
distinguished scientist to the univer-
sity.

Dr. McMurrich is a graduate in
arts of the university, a Ph.D. of Johns
Hopkins University, Baltimore, 13 years
professor of anatomy at the university
of Massachusetts, one of the leading
positions in the United States. In ad-
dition he is the author of many stand-
ard works on anatomy and took first
rank with the leading scientists of
the world.

Dr. McMurrich in reply said he
heartily thanked them for their cor-
dial reception—he was proud to return
to his alma mater, as he was now
entering upon the dawn of the golden
age.

Dr. A. R. Reeve welcomed the stu-
dents and introduced Dr. J. H. Rich-
ardson, who 30 years ago was acting
professor of anatomy in the old King's
College days. Dr. Richardson spoke
of the development and progress made
by the university since his early
days.

Dr. Primrose, registrar, stated there
were 19 freshmen this session, and
he expected there would be over 200
in the next few days. The average at-
tendance in former years was between
700 and 800, but this session gave evi-
dence of being a record one.
