In districts where the children speak French whol-ly, they are to have a teacher speaking

where the childrén speak French whol-ly, they are to have a teacher speaking both French and English, so that they will learn English as rapidly as pos-sible. The readers used in such schools will be bi-lingual, so that the child-ren will grow up from the first ac-customed to English."
