SPANISH MINISTER LEAVES WASHINGTON

The President's Signature Was Attached to the Momentous Documents Yesterday, and War Must Follow-The U.S. Senators Review Their Action and Take Back Nothing-

President McKinley signed the Cuban resolutions yesterday morning at 11.24 o'clock. The ultimatum had already been drafted into the cable 'code and transmitted to Madrid, where it will be laid before the Spanish Government by Minister Woodford. A copy of the ultimatum was entrusted to a colored messenger from the State Department, who delivered it to Senor Polo, the Spanish Minister, at 11.20 a.m. Senor Polo handed the messenger a letter, which had been prepared some days previous. The letter was addressed to the State Department, and contained a demand from Senor Polo that his passport be sent him as the action of the United States Congress was of "such a nature that his presence in Washington was impossible." He stated that the stection of the Spanish interests would be entrusted to the French and

Secretary Day ordered the passport to be prepared-The House was notified that the President had signed the Cuban resolutions and they expressed their approval by enthusiastic cheering. It is promised that the terms of the ultimatum will be made public to-day.

A reply to the ultimatum is demanded before Saturday at midnight. In the event of delay the President notifies Spain that he will carry out the instructions of Congress and make armed intervention to enforce his demands. There is a possibility that this time allowance may be extended by some
