TRIBUTES TO DEAD JURIST

Body of the Late Justice Mills En Route to Final Resting Place.

Services at Ottawa Residence

Old Friends Testify to Sterling Qualities of the Deceased.

Ottawa, May 12.—(Special).—The death of Mr. Justice Mills was recalled three times today, in the presence of Chief Justice Taschereau made an address, which in its due and discriminating praise and felicitous language remained the listeners of best specimens of Laurier. His chief interest of course lay in its appreciation of Mills as a judge. There is no harm in saying now that lawyers looked on the appointment with mingling, owing to his lack of practical experience. The chief justice said: "As a judge, he was a man of indefatigable industry, combined with an unusual amount of sound practical sense and sound judgment, and his opinions always commanded profound respect from all. He was of sweet, gentle disposition, with quiet manner and modest and unassuming bearing. His relations with his colleagues and with the officers and personnel of the court were marked by uniform kindness and courtesy. During his brief career on the bench, he earned the confidence and respect of his colleagues, and his opinions were always received with the most respectful attention and appreciation of argument; for his industry in the investigation of truth, and for his scrupulous care in preparing his opinions. On their face, his books, a deep knowledge of the fundamental principles of the law and a keen pursuit of authority. A more conscientious and upright judge the country never saw. He has been a true fellow-worker, who has repeatedly notified that his desire to do exactly right coupled with his modest opinion of his ability, caused him, in many cases, more than the usual anxiety to be correct in the performance of judicial duties.

RETAILERS SEND DEPUTATION

To Ottawa to Protest Against Milk Can and Tax Legislation.

A deputation left last night from the Retail Merchants' Association for Ottawa. They go to oppose the bill brought before the House by Archibald Campbell, forcing all milk dealers to have their eight-gallon cans stamped. The objection the retailers has against this proposal is that the cans, stamped, and as a result, contain less milk than originally intended.

Another deputation from the same association will also wait upon the government. Mr. W. B. Hamilton, chairman of the Retail Merchants' Association, will lead the deputation. They will meet a special committee appointed by the government to discuss the assessment bill. The number of assessment as set forth in the bill, the retailers claim, will fall heavily upon them. If the bill passes, the retailers will be assessed on the basis of 75 per cent of the rental value of the property.

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STATE SOCIALISM

How New South Wales Relieves the Distress of Unemployed.

London Daily Mail: Among the many expedients which the New South Wales state government is adopting in its efforts to alleviate the distress which exists in Sydney owing to the large number of unemployed is the establishment of a "relief farm," writes our Sydney correspondent.

An area of land in one of the more distant suburbs of the city has been acquired and placed under cultivation, and in return for his shelter and food he must do a certain amount of work. If he works for one hour he gets his supper; if for two hours his supper and a bed; if for three hours his supper, a bed and his breakfast. Then, in the morning, he must leave for the city or elsewhere in search of employment, and if he fails he can go back to the depot again.

So much for what is known as the "casual." But, in addition, there is what is known as a "permanent" class. This class consists mostly of the party incapable, or invalids, and these are kept at the institution for a period not exceeding three months.
