THE PARIS.

Queenstown, April 23.—The steamer Majestic passed the Paris at 4 o'clock Monday morning in latitude 43, longitude 28. Passengers say a battleship and three torpedo boats, evidently Spanish, were passed at midnight Saturday, when she was 1,700 miles west of Queenstown, at that time the Paris was 750 miles farther west.

THE OREGON.

Buenos Ayres, April 23.—A British steamer just arrived at Montevideo, reports that she left the United States battleship Oregon and the gunboat Marietta taking coal at Punta Arenas, in the Straits of Magellan. It is believed the Spanish torpedo boat, Ramon, is about to go out of port.

MALLORY LINE OUT OFF.

New York, April 23.—Mr. Charles A. Mallory stated yesterday that the Mallory Line service to Galveston and Key West would be suspended for the present, owing to the war with Spain.

PHILIPPINE PACIFIC BUTCH-ERED.

New York, April 23.—Advices from the Philippines via Hong Kong report that Spanish troops surrounded a gathering of pacificos and killed sixteen. Later 67 pacificos were conveyed to the cemetery, forced to kneel beside their own graves, and then shot. Most of them were innocent, and none were allowed trial.

HAYTI IN HOT WATER.

Port-au-Prince, Hayti, April 23.—The Haytian Government is somewhat worried by the obligations of the treaty with the United States, fearing that a fulfillment of articles 15, 20 and 22 would invite a Spanish attack. The government wishes to restrict its policy to mere neutrality. United States Minister Powell assured the government that America will exact all the obligations of the treaty, and has demanded that no shelter shall be given a privateer in any circumstances. Spain not having equal treaty privileges with the United States, an opposite course, Mr. Powell contends, must necessarily be resorted to by the United States. The government is well disposed to America, and will probably acquiesce.

PORTUGAL NEUTRAL.

Lisbon, April 23.—The state council meets today to decree neutrality, after which the Spanish squadron must leave the Cape Verde Islands.

In Spain.

WITH THE DYNASTY.
Madrid, April 23.—As a counterpoise to the growing sympathy towards the Carlists among the people since Don Carlos raised a victorious army against the United States, the Spaniards are now collectively declaring their devotion to and support of the reigning dynasty. They are endeavoring to convince the people that the queen regent has never advocated peace at any price, but has thoroughly participated in the honor and rights of Spain. This attitude of the prelates will cause a further irritation of the country, greatly irritating the Carlists.

The Spanish naval authorities are notified that Spain can easily force the blockade of Cuba, when she desires to do so. But in the meantime it is explained that as the governors of Cuba and Porto Rico have advised the Spanish Government that their aid need not be feared, the government has decided to "utilize the war ships elsewhere."

SPAIN'S WAYS AND MEANS.

THE BLOCKADING STILL ON.

On board the Spanish ship New York, off Havana, April 23.—The blockade continues without incident. The torpedo boat Dupin arrived from Matanzas, reporting that there had been no more fighting there and that the blockade was effectively established. No prizes have been secured by the Matanzas squadron. News has been received that the La Lucha asserted that two coasting steamers had sneaked into Havana harbor on Saturday, but at that time the blockade was only in its initial stages. Today the squadron is equipped with a force of small boats, which, under cover of darkness, can get close in shore, where they are likely to prevent blockade running by the little steamers into Havana last Saturday must have been so small as to be practically of no effect.

NO PICNIC.

Havana even now feels the pinch of the blockade. When need of food becomes imperative, then, if there is money enough in the city to make it worth while, there are likely to be many attempts at blockade running; but Rear Admiral Sampson says they will be unsuccessful.

THE INSURGENTS.

Information regarding the movement of the insurgents is meager; but it is known that as many as can are leaving Havana. The insurgent army is believed to be active and is trusted to cut off all communication between North and South Cuba, though communication between Havana and Matanzas still appears to exist. Much has been written regarding concerted movement by the insurgents upon Havana and its defenses. This seems hardly feasible. The scarcity of food is bound to affect the army, and Spanish troops are likely to be the more successful in their campaign into the far north of the island if they are confronted with starvation.

UNCLE SAM'S IRISH FRIENDS.

London, April 23.—A meeting of the Irish members of the House of Commons was held, at which Mr. John Dillon presided. Mr. Dillon proposed, and Mr. Michael Davitt seconded, this motion: "Resolved, that the Irish National Parliamentary party hereby tender its warmest sympathy and good wishes to the government and people of the United States in their humane efforts to liberate the people of Cuba."

EX-MINISTER POLO'S POSITION.

Mr. Balfour says: "Senor Polo de Bernabe is now a resident of Toronto, and is in exactly the same position as Mr. Dillon. He is a private citizen, and has no limitations placed upon him other than the duty of observing the provisions of the foreign enlistment act. There is no foundation for the suggestion that he is accredited to the whole of North America, and has therefore a definite status in Canada."

IN CANADIAN WATERS.

St. John's, Nfld., April 23.—Advices from English and Spanish agents of mercantile firms here indicate the Spanish fleet from Cape Verde is likely to appear first in this locality hoping to obtain coal.

AT "GIB."

London, April 23.—The correspondence of the Daily Telegraph at Gibraltar, telegraphing from Algeciras, says: "I have just arrived today from Algeciras, on the west side of the Bay of Cádiz, where the Spanish torpedo boat destroyer, Destructora, is being refitted. I learned after receipt of a telegram, and had not returned to Algeciras, that all kinds of rumors are current, and the British commander Charybdis is suddenly leaving tonight."

IN THE ITALIAN CHAMBER.

Rome, April 23.—In the Chamber of Deputies, in reply to questions, said that the Spanish Government had declared sulphur contraband of war. The Italian Government, he added, was fully impressed with the importance of the sulphur trade for Italy and Sicily, but thought it advisable not to make a declaration on the subject at the present moment. With reference to reports that sailors were being enrolled in Italy for service in the United States navy, Count Bonin Longare said the government was without official information as to the matter, but that orders would be given for a strict observance of neutrality and the provisions of the penal code.
