Chance's Cubs Lose Again; Could Not Hit Spit Ball

Walsh Struck Out Even Dozen With His Deadly Damp Delivery.

Chicago, Oct. 11.—Chance's champs today looked at some spit-ball pitching as it is shown by star workmen of the league that breeds the masters of the despised, but deadly, damp delivery. As a result, they were the victims of the first-shut-out in the world's series, the Sox making the record stand 2 to 1 in their favor, by a 3-to-0 score.

Big Ed Walsh went on the slab for the American Leaguers, and there was not a minute that he was not master of the situation. His pitching was one of the most impressive exhibitions, the assembled critics agreed, that has been given in recent years. Just four men reached first base on him, and an error on a very easy chance was responsible for one of the cases. He was touched for two hits in his opening inning, and was not threatened by another to the finish of the contest.

Spit Ball Deceived Cubs.

Before the series it was contended that Comiskey's chances rested entirely on the fact that the left-hand and spit-ball pitching of the American League, is superior to the same goods as delivered in the older organization. Atroch had them on his mind on Tuesday. Using White right back was a mistake, and cost any chance in the second game, though the Sox did not have much opportunity against Reulbach. Walsh's spit ball today proved to be the destroyer that had been anticipated. The effort was made to hit it were at times almost painful. Walsh depended mainly on his spit ball, but did not rely on it entirely. With it he mixed a curve ball that had a good break. The game started in sunshine, but soon became gray and cloudy, and after the day darkened the work of Walsh was much more effective than in the opening rounds. As soon as the Cubs found that they could not hit the spit ball, they began stepping on it or bunting. Walsh, however, out-guessed them, mixing his curved ball with the splitter. These tactics stilled the National League on their heads. They gave up bunting after two or three of them had been made to look very bad, and resumed swinging. Exactly four balls were hit to the outfield by them, two of these being fly catches, two of them safe hits.

Walsh's Great Work.

Twelve men were fanned by Walsh, Chance and Steinfield alone escaped. He got at least one man in each inning of the game. Schulte hit him for two bases in the first inning and was struck out the next times up. His spit ball was the third strike usually. No less than four times this third strike got away from Sullivan, who threw out two of the men at first and tagged the other two before they could get away from the plate. In the ninth inning the only ball that got away from Sullivan to count for anything, was thrown by Walsh, advancing Gessler from second to third. Pfeister, the Cubs' young left-hander, worked for the Nationals, and did splendidly outside of one inning. He himself fanned nine men and once retired the side after Donohue had tripled with one gone. His game he really lost himself, by an error of judgment in the eighth, when, with one on and no one out, he tried to get Walsh to bite at bad ones, instead of making the batter bunt. Walsh waited out four and his nerve, as will be shown later, won the game.

Rohe Again a Hero.

George Rohe, the two-headed third-sacker, whom Comiskey has had for over a year without finding a regular job for him, was again the hero of the offensive work. He won the opener by a triple with which he started the fifth inning. Today he won another victory by a three-sacker to the same spot in the sixth inning, with the bases full and two out. If the Sox win the series, Rohe is sure of a lifetime job with Comiskey as Isbell has been holding one for his work in other big races. Perhaps Rohe will replace Issey as the family pet. The big second-sacker is about done. His work today was again uncertain in the field, while he struck out three times, once with the base full and a long fly good for the first run. Without Davis he is of no use. If Davis gets back, the popular move will be to put Rohe at second in Isbell's place. To tell the truth, the Sox, figuring the teams on paper, look like a jest when compared with the Cubs. Evers had it on Isbell when the latter was at his best, and Rohe is at sea when the Cubs bunt. Barring Jones, the Sox outfield does not class with that of the Cubs, especially now, when O'Neill is in right. Hahn was hit on the nose by a pitched ball today. The organ is badly swollen, but not broken. He may be out of the full series. It's up to the pitchers, as already shown. Without Walsh today the Sox would have had a hard time winning.

Sox Strike Out.

Jones in the first and Donohue in the second each got a scratch hit. Each was second batter. Each time the next hitter fanned and both of the men who had singled were then thrown out stealing. In each of the third and fourth innings two Sox were struck out. This brought it up to the fifth. Evers stole a base hit from Rohe by a marvelous stop and throw. This cost a run, as Donohue followed with a triple to right field. Dougherty fouled out and Sullivan fanned. It looked like the lost chance. Tannehill surprised by opening the sixth with a pretty single to left. Walsh was up to sacrifice and showed splendid nerve and judgment by letting Pfeister waste bad ones on him. Had he been forced to bunt he would have been second out, possibly preventing a score that inning. He walked. Then Pfeister filled the bases by hitting Hahn on the nose, in an effort to keep the ball in close where the batter could not bunt successfully. O'Neill went in

for Hahn, who was sent away for repairs.

Jones tried hard, but a great catch of his foul by Kling set him down. Isbell took three wide swings and retired. This brought up Rohe. He caught a high fast one square, drove it into left field about a yard or two inside the foul line, and cleared the sacks. He was left at third, but his hit won the game.

Dougherty was safe on Tinker's fumble in the seventh, but could not get around. Rohe walked and stole in the ninth, but died trying to score on Dougherty's grounder to Chance, after Donohue sacrificed him to third. Rohe kept them chasing him until Pat reached third base, but Sullivan flied out.

Where the Cubs Lost a Chance.

The Cubs' one chance was in the first inning. Hoffman singled to center and Sheppard struck out trying to bunt. Walsh's spit ball. Hoffman then attempted to steal and Sullivan got him easily. Schulte followed with a double to left, but Chance's easy bouncer to Isbell stranded him. They never figured after that. Up to the fifth inning the only other Cub to reach first base was Chance, who walked with two out in the fourth inning.

In the ninth Pfeister was due to open, but Gessler, once with Detroit, batted for him. Isbell kicked his grounder and he was safe. He made second when Hoffman grounded to Isbell. Then he went to third on a spit ball that hit the plate and bounded away from Sullivan. He had an excellent view of Sheppard's and Schulte's strike outs with which Walsh wound up his game.

Walsh's strike-outs were Sheppard, second; Tinker, third; Kling, Pfeister; fourth; Schulte; fifth; Evers; sixth; Hoffman; seventh; Schulte; eighth; Tinker; Evers; ninth; Sheppard and Schulte.

He defeated Ecstastic, winner of the Tennessee stake, Angus Pointer, Gratt, Laocanda and Bolivar. None of the other horses had any excuse, for Baron Grattan simply outtraced them.
