HORSE SMOTHERED IN LOCAL SEWER

Valuable Animal Belonging to F. C. Toon, Grocer, Killed on Ridout Street.

A horse belonging to Mr. F. C. Toon, the Talbot street grocer, fell into the Ridout street sewer Saturday night, and before it could be removed death had resulted from strangulation. There is likely to be a claim for damages arising from the accident as Mr. Toon claims that the sewer was not properly protected.

A young lad who had charge of the delivery wagon had taken home a wagon with a broken spring, and was leading the horse down town to get another wagon. When alongside the sewer the horse became frightened and commenced backing up. The boy could not restrain the horse, and it fell into the sewer, carrying a lot of loose sand with it. The animal was completely covered up. The boy ran for assistance, and the sand was removed. The horse was smothered before it was removed. It was also found that a leg was broken by the fall. The ditch was fifteen feet deep.

A LONDONER'S SUCCESS

W. H. Wilson, Managing One of New York's Largest Cigar Departments.

LOTTIE GARRISON MAY BE HEIRESS

Entitled to Money Left by an Aunt Who Was Killed in San Francisco.

Detroit, Sept. 30.—It is possible (according to the News) that Lottie Garrison now in Red Cross Hospital, suffering from a mental disease which has impaired her memory, is in reality Miss Debbie Alward, one of the heirs to a fortune of \$67,000. Detectives are searching Detroit for Miss Alward, whose aunt, Mrs. Maggie Ostrander, was killed during the San Francisco earthquake, leaving a large amount of property to Debbie, her brother, W. H. Alward, and their cousin, W. R. Alward. The brother is now in Detroit searching for Debbie, who mysteriously disappeared about four years ago. There is reason to believe that Debbie Alward and Lottie Garrison are the same.

While still an infant Debbie was left an orphan in Culloden, Ont., where she was adopted and brought up by Joseph Baseline. Some years ago she left the home of her foster parents, and was later employed as a waitress in a hotel at St. Thomas, Ont. From there she came to Detroit, where she was known as Mabel Ostrander. About four years ago she worked for a family on Gestat avenue under the name of Mabel O'Brien.

Lottie Garrison, Jackson, or Jacobs, for she has given all three names, is now in the hospital, suffering from strange delusions. She is tormented by two figures in white, which she says are her mother and sister, who plague her about some wicked deed which she imagines she has committed. At times she is quiet, at others

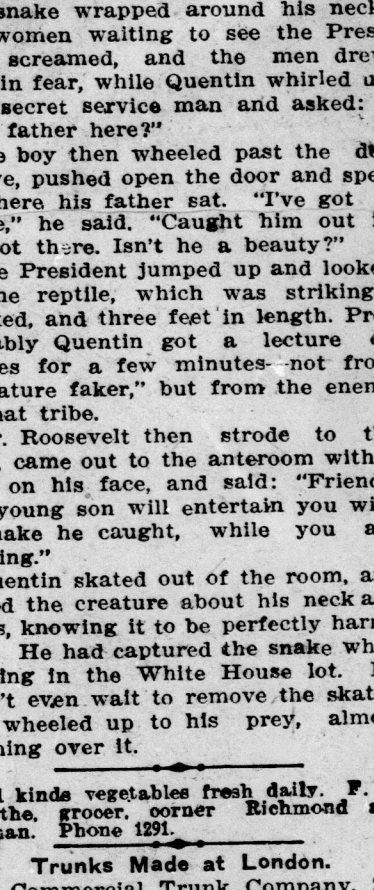
