power that our export trade during the past year has exceeded that of any in our history. Our total exports of agricultural products, including livestock and their products, for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1914, amounted to \$25,000,000, as compared with \$20,000,000 for the year ending March 31, 1913; it was increased to the \$27,000,000 for the year ending March 31, 1914, or an increase of over \$200,000,000 in four years. When we recall the increased prices which have obtained for our principal export products sold for consumption in Canada, and the fact that the Canadian farmers of Canada last year received for their produce a sum very much in excess of the sum which they had received in 1913, it is not surprising that the following crops:

"With the magnificent crops in Ontario this year, and the high prices now prevailing, I am advised the wheat in Ontario and Eastern Canada, will be sold at a better financial position at any period of their history. I am also inclined to learn that while it has meant a harder hand work on the part of the farmers, no crops have been lost owing to shortage of grain, and that the farmers have not found it necessary to make advantage of the labor offered from the towns to assist their work.

Increase in our export trade of agricul-

...cultural produce has been exceeded by the increase in our exports of manufactured articles. Our total exports of manufactures for the year ending March 31, 1914, amounted to \$27,452,000. This amount has been increased in 1915 to the surprising total of \$62,000,000, an increase of \$34,548,000, or in other words, 1,000 per cent. This enormous expansion has been largely due to the development of the munitions industry in Canada.

"The total exports of the products of Canada for 1915 exceeded those of 1914 by over \$1,108,000."
