

About 80 Per Cent of Tuberculous Military Patients Sent to Byron Sanatorium Leave Completely Cured

"Reconstruction" of Most Practical Type Going On There With Great Success—Disease Among Soldiers Discovered Early and Treatment Is Begun With All Facts Definitely Established.

"Reconstruction," a word which is almost everyone's lips in these early post-war days, is a term of rather wide and too often vague application, but at least one phase of the general scheme of reconstruction is being worked out in a very definite and a very practical way at the Queen Alexandra Sanatorium, as a visitor to the military institution at the Byron very soon ascertains. And that the work is being done in a most practical way is evidenced by the fact that of all the soldiers who have been treated at the sanatorium, about eighty per cent are finally discharged completely cured. At present the total number of patients is close to two hundred.

A Wonderful Record. The civilian tuberculosis sanatorium can even now duplicate, and the explanation of the splendid results achieved is to be found in several co-related facts. In the first place, because a soldier's tuberculosis is discovered early and treatment is begun with all facts definitely established. In the second place, because a soldier's tuberculosis is in perfect physical condition, he is under constant medical supervision. In the third place, because the military authorities have always at their disposal the services of the best specialists in all branches of medicine and surgery. Discovery. Because of all these things tuberculosis in the case of a soldier is almost always discovered before it has reached more than an incipient stage. Directly a soldier becomes ill he is examined by a medical board. If the slightest suspicion of tuberculosis is entertained, he is further examined by a specialist in the treatment and diagnosis of that disease. If the specialist decides that he is a tuberculous case he is sent to the sanatorium, where his exact condition is determined by a thorough and systematic "search."

More Charge. Next the patient is placed under the European and another chart is compiled. Finally he is X-rayed and still another report is prepared. The result is accepted, but in case of any slightest variation from the standard check is applied until the mistake is discovered. So that the doctors and nurses, when treatment commences, know exactly what kind of a condition they have to deal with.

Discipline Strict. At Byron the discipline, in some respects, is very strict. Certain hours are prescribed for rest, and during the rest period the patients are not allowed to leave their beds. At other times, but except by special permission, must not leave the grounds.

CLERIC DENOUNCES PERSONAL LIBERTY

WOULD RESTORE TRAFFIC Proud of Britain, But Does Not Want Her Vices Imported.

Under S. C. R. of the Byron Sanatorium, so far as treatment and discipline are concerned, is under the control of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, generally known as the S. C. R. As its name implies, it is concerned not only with the restoration to health of the men who come under its jurisdiction, but also with their re-establishment in civil life after they are cured. With that end in view an attempt is made to give them, through the medium of vocational classes, to prepare the men to become economically independent wage-earners and useful citizens.

Many Courses. Practically every patient in the institution is taking one or other of the vocational courses of instruction. These include woodworking, shoemaking, type-writing, telegraphy, draughtsmanship, bookbinding and those who desire to do so are also given an opportunity to learn music. Expert instruction is provided, and the teachers in the other classes are also experts in their respective lines. Incidentally almost all of the instructors are themselves undergoing treatment.

In some cases, of course, men are discharged as cured before they have completed their courses, but these are given an opportunity of completing the courses in classes maintained by the S. C. R. outside of the sanatorium.

Part of Treatment. In any event the instruction given is considered partly in the light of occupational therapy; that is, it helps to keep the minds and bodies of the student-patients healthfully employed, thus helping to make the general treatment more effective.

Entertainment Also. In the case of men who, being "bed patients," are unable to attend the vocational classes, occupational therapy is applied through the medium of games, board games, and other amusements. Queries Regarding Military Service

Address Your Problems to the Military Editor of The Advertiser and They Will Be Answered From Official Information.

ST. THOMAS, Q.—I enlisted in the navy on or about November 1916, at Toronto, proceeding overseas in December of the same year. I saw active service in the British navy until January 9, 1919, and was discharged on that date at Halifax. How much war service gratuity should I receive?

A.—I have received none as yet. How should I proceed to obtain same?

A.—I. For two years' service and less than three years in the naval forces you are entitled to receive 183 days' pay and allowances of rank at a minimum rate of \$100 per month for married men, and a minimum rate of \$70 for single men with no dependents.

2. Application forms for war service gratuity may be obtained from the Great War Veterans' Association, London Branch, or District Paymaster, Wolseley Barracks, London, Ont., and upon being filled in and an affidavit made as to truth of statements contained therein, they are returned to the district paymaster, who forwards them to Ottawa, for verification, to be followed upon after by payments of gratuity.

SUBSCRIBER, Q.—I. On January 10, I received papers ordering me to report to the military authorities for discharge, on January 14, with an alternative of taking the papers to a notary public and having them signed without reporting for discharge. Last week I received another letter stating that I had been struck off the strength. How long should it be until I receive my discharge papers, or until I receive any further documents?
