BRITISH GOVERNMENT NOT RESPONSIBLE IF MAGSWEENEY STARVES

Lucerne, Switzerland, Aug. 25.—Premier Lloyd George, in a statement today concerning the case of Lord Mayor MacSweeney of Cork, whose condition is grave because of his hunger strike in Brixton Jail, London, said in substance that, whatever the consequences, the Government could not take the responsibility of releasing MacSweeney. The premier decalred he regretted MacSweeney had decided to starve himself, but said that if he were released then all the other hunger strikers would have to be released.

"A law which is a respecter of persons is no law." Mr. Lloyd George's statement continued. "If the cabinet, therefore, departed from its decision, a complete breakdown of the whole machinery of law and Government in Ireland inevitably would follow.

Against Soviet Troops Continues.

60,000 REDS TAKEN

Entire Country Is Virtually Clear of Russian Red Invaders.

London, Aug. 25 .- Negotiations leading to the surrender to the Poles have been commenced by the Northern Russian Bolshevik army, according to a Vienna dispatch received here. Latest information from Warsaw indicates the advance of the Polish armies continues wireless dispatch filed in that city on advance of the Polish armies continues rapidly, and that the Bolsheviki seem anxious only to lose contact with the Poles. Some 60,000 prisoners have been taken.

KOLNO CAPTURED BY POLES: 10,000 PRISONERS TAKEN

Warsaw, Aug. 25 .- Kolno, an important town near the East Prussian frontier north of Lomza, has been taken by Polish forces which have been sweeping rapidly northward in pursuit of the retiring Bolsheviki. More than 10,000 prisoners, who were cut off from the main body of the Soviet army have been captured in this region.

Reports from various fronts, particularly larly the northern sectors of the line, indicate the Bolsheviki are demoralized and fleeing everywhere in great disorder. Gen. Solnowkowski, minister of war, has issued a statement to Polish newspapers declaring that the Soviet armies have been decisively heaten.

Advance of the Polish Forces Boundary Line Between Poland and Russia, As Outlined by Lord Curzon, Declared In acceptable-Poles Refuse To Demobilize Unless Russia Takes Similar Action-Line of Demarkation Must Be Based On Strategic Considerations.

> London, Aug. 25.—An immediate rupture of the Russo-Polish peace negotiations at Minsk will result if the Poles adher to their demand for withdrawal of the main Russian terms, says a message received here today from George Tchitcher-in, the Russian soviet foreign min-ister, dated Monday at Moscow.
