U.S.-JAPANESE AGREEMENT. While the agreement into which

the United States and Japan are reported to have just entered contains nothing which modifies the existing international attitude towards China. it is of considerable importance as between the contracting parties themselves. It ought to remove any doubt regarding the perfectly correct relations that have subsisted between the two governments and in all the points with which the agreement deals it is entirely in accord with the Anglo-Japanese treaty of alliance. Extremists of the Hobson type are not likely to admit that the new situation removes the risk of a descent on the Philippines-they will rather exhibit it as another proof of their subtle diplomacy veiling Japanese aggressive designs. But whatever the future may hold when China escapes from tutelage, there is every reason to regard the status quo in the far east as in the meantime assured.

BRITISH LICENSING REFORM. By rejecting the Licensing Bill the house of lords has opened up a new

for restoration of the state's unrestricted power to control the liquor traffic of the United Kingdom. For the first time licensing reform has been presented to the people in concrete shape, and the point raised is one that can be easily understood and appreclated. For the peers by their action have repudiated the contention that license monopolies can be extinguished by an undisturbed time limit-in other words they have advanced the proposition that irrespective of its annual character a license holder has not only a "vested right" to a renewal of it, but that the "vested right" really amounts in practice to a freehold. This is in direct contradiction. to the interpretation placed by the house of lords, in its judicial capacity as the highest court of appeal, on the law as it existed prior to the Licensing Act passed by the late Unionist Parliament, and also to the provision for the extinction of licenses contained in that act itself.

The defendant, Horan, knew that there was litigation between the defendant.
