

Marathon Shrubb Collapses

Note and Comment

When this race was postponed to last night the story went out that both Shrubb and Longboat were in bad physical condition—the Indian almost a hopeless wreck. It was not till last Monday that The World printed a special from Washington giving the result of the Canadian's race with a relay of soldiers and pointing out boldly that the Indian was himself again. Soon all reliable newspapers fell into line with the opinion that Tom was in fine fettle to race Shrubb.

Well perhaps Longboat was not at his best, but he was good enough for the task. True, the time was slow, about a six-minute gait. Shrubb had a lead at one time of almost a mile, but, nothing daunted, the Toronto hander and Trainer De Forest kept their man at an even clip till the other fellow's inevitable breakdown came. Shrubb walked while Longboat ran and the end was in sight.

Shrubb undoubtedly ran a plucky race. He trained so satisfactorily that not only himself but his friends were led to believe that he could beat Longboat at the Marathon distance, and thus become the champion of the world. The Englishman was favorite and the victory of the Indian is thus all the more emphatic.

The time was ridiculously slow even for a Marathon, and to those who will now persist that Shrubb will surely beat Longboat at ten or fifteen miles it is only necessary to point to the Indian's time for those distances, and next race he'll surely have the advice to go at the faster clip.

Tom Longboat Again Winner Alfred Shrubb Does Not Finish

Englishman, Once Nearly Mile Ahead, Drops Out at Twenty-Five Miles and Five Laps.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—(Special.)—Another Marathon has been run and won. The victor, Tom Longboat, well deserves the race, as he met and defeated the world's greatest ten and fifteen mile runner, Alfred Shrubb, the English champion. The task was too much for the little fellow, and he gave the ghost at the twenty-fifth mile, fifth lap.

Shrubb jumped to the front and kept the lead until he quit. He gained lap after lap, and at one time was nearly a mile ahead of the Indian, who, at the twenty-third mile, began showing signs of distress. At twenty-three and a half miles Shrubb stopped, knelt and adjusted his shoes. Longboat gained a lap he had lost, but the Englishman arose and sprang after him with the speed of a deer. At this juncture Planagan appeared at the track side with the Indian's bride. Tom smiled broadly, nodded his head and took from his pocket a small Indian square waved encouragement at each lap and the new life injected into the race caused Shrubb to lose heart. Shrubb began to walk at the twenty-fourth mile, and Longboat began to make lap after lap. Shrubb was done for. He was wobbling and tears streamed down his cheeks. He knew defeat was his yet he staggered on, refusing to quit. His gait was nothing but a walk. Honors were even as the end of the race drew near. Had Shrubb had any Crow's Nest Pass line to Aldersyde, on the Macleod branch. The company is also asking for an extension of time to construct several other branches authorized.

Tom Planagan was beside the ring and working like a Trojan. "I'm satisfied," said he as he noticed the distress of Shrubb. At the end of the twenty-fifth mile and fifth lap Shrubb walked into the arms of his trainer and was led from the track. Longboat continued and finished the race. He received a rousing ovation.
The preliminary five-mile race between Bob Hale and Mike Spring was won by the former with two laps to spare. Time 27.20-1.5. Promptly at 9 o'clock State Senator Timothy D. Sullivan fired the gun that started Shrubb and Longboat on their long run. They ran as a team till the two laps. When Shrubb took the lead, Longboat fell in behind him and the grind was on at a lively clip.

CANADIANS ALL HAD SEATS
Standing Room Sign Was Early Displayed at Madison Square Garden.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—(Special.)—Our own commissioner, the Marathon craze is yet in its infancy in New York. Enthusiasm has not waned in the least, and had a building twice the size of the Madison Square Garden been available, its capacity would have been taxed to the utmost to accommodate the Marathon bugs that, hours before the doors opened, crowded the thoroughfares surrounding the building and struggled with each other to secure a position that would give them the best view of the race.

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The process of securing tickets were slow and the long line passed before the ticket booths and were supplied, they either entered the building or joined the line. Only a small portion of the millionaires rubbed elbows with the street laboring Italian, who, with dirt begrimed clothes, was as eager to secure admission as was his more fortunate neighbor. All nationalities were among the masses, but all were good natured and the police officials who managed the thousands with marvelous skill. Conspicuous by their absence were the Canadian contingent. They were not waiting for tickets, thanks to the forethought of J. J. McCaffery and Tom Planagan. These gentlemen had provided provision for the Canadian sports, and they were provided with tickets of admission before leaving their hotels.

Tonight, as good as 8 to 5 can be had against Longboat. The Canadian visitors last night backed Longboat at odds of 7 to 5, 6 to 5 and in some instances were eager to get even money. I have seen both Longboat and Shrubb run, and while I certainly give Shrubb credit for his speed, I have no hesitancy in saying that Longboat is capable of running Shrubb off his feet at any distance from ten to one hundred miles.

Inside the large building an hour before the circus began there was not a vacant seat. The standing room was occupied to the brim. Many ladies were present and were as enthusiastic as the men. Some were bold enough to flourish bills of large denominations and banter their immediate neighbors to make a bet. On the whole, however, few large wagers were made in the building, most of the large money being placed in the hotel lobbies.
Tonight's contest is a duel between a native American, likewise a native Canadian, and a native Englishman. The United States doesn't get much glory out of the finish either one way or the other, but it has all the excitement of looking at the race, which is better than being counted out altogether.
Prior to the actual start of the affair both men are in good condition. Shrubb has recovered from the injury to his great toe, and he was seriously injured. So much so that when an incision was made into the seat of inflammation, poisonous matter was removed. No bluff, therefore, on the Englishman's part. Longboat is running better than he ever did. If the reports of his trainer are true, there are some of the Canadian backers of the Indian who insist that Longboat

never has been seen at his best in New York or in any other city. If that is the case, perhaps he will do Shrubb with such relentless determination that the little fellow will be run into the ground before twenty miles have been reached. Bear in mind that it is all new work to Shrubb, and that the experiment of going beyond fifteen miles is as much of a novelty to him as it will be to any of the spectators. In his trial, when he injured his foot, it is said that he ran more than twenty miles, after that he was not far from the time which is needed to make Longboat hustle. If it comes to the final lap to win, shut your eyes and take your choice.

IN THE CANADA GAZETTE

C. P. R. Applies for Extension in West—Contract to Irrigate.

OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—(Special.)—The Canadian Pacific Railway is applying for power to construct a line eighty-five miles long, from a point on the Lake Huron, Huron County, Ont., to Crow's Nest Pass line to Aldersyde, on the Macleod branch. The company is also asking for an extension of time to construct several other branches authorized.

The London & Northwestern Railway Co. will seek incorporation, with power to build a line of railway from London to Sarnia, and from London to a point on Lake Huron, Huron County, Ont. Orders-in-council of Nov. 28, relating to foot and mouth diseases, have been rescinded. It is also ordered that ships leaving Atlantic ports carrying live stock must not stop at Canadian ports. The government has entered into an arrangement with F. Aylwyn, civil engineer of Ottawa, to irrigate 69,275 acres of land east of Calgary at an expenditure of half a million dollars. G. G. McNab of Gravenhurst has been appointed school inspector of North Renfrew.

Award for Arbitrators.
GUELPH, Feb. 5.—(Special.)—The award made by the arbitrators in the expropriation of property for water extensions pursuant to a resolution of the Guelph water commissioners. Judges Snider, McMillan and Hardy, who were the commissioners, decided that the amount of property required by the city for its new water system was worth \$1400 or \$3800. If Mr. Rudd took the buildings. The city pays the cost of the arbitration, about \$600. This is about the city's valuation of the property expropriated.

Flaker Boy Heir to \$800,000.
SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, Feb. 5.—A poor fisher boy of San Sebastian named Lojabe, upon his returning from a cruise, was met on the wharf by two strangers, who asked him if he knew who his parents were. The boy replied no. The strangers then informed him that they were the executors of the will of his mother, an American woman, who died, leaving him \$800,000.

Complete Works Tolstol.
MOSCOW, Feb. 5.—A low publishing-house is planning to bring out the long awaited complete edition of the works of Leo Tolstol. Royalties to the amount of \$25,000 will be paid in annual instalments of \$25,000. It is declared that with the approval of the Russian government, the works of the count will be included in this edition, which will number about twenty-five volumes.

Babe Found Dead.
William Watson, the five-months infant Mr. and Mrs. William Watson, was found dead by its grandmother at her home, 95 Parliament-street, at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. Coroner G. W. Graham, Avenue-road, found that death was due to bronchial pneumonia.

Marathon Night Like Election Time On Toronto Streets

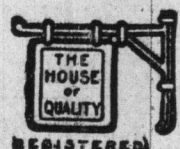
If New York was Marathon mad Toronto was more so. The downtown streets last night resembled election times without exaggeration. The newspaper bulletin boards caused sidewalk blockades till midnight, when Shrubb collapsed.

The drizzling rain sent a steady stream of athletic fans to Massey Hall, where the race was called off before a crowd that reached immense proportions at 11 p.m. The Highlanders' band gave a fine musical program and altogether the crowd enjoyed the show. Riverdale rink was jammed to the doors at the athletic meet, where the race was also followed. The many Englishmen in both places caused little ructions at intervals. The old countrymen had their tormentors pretty well subdued at 20 miles, but the Canadian supporters soon got back with a vengeance. All the theatres gave the early bellings.

There were all sorts of betting thrut-out, even when it was announced that Longboat's backers had lost faith. The early quotation was even money, and the odds ranged up to 3 to 1. Several local Indians cleaned up handsomely at 2 to 1.

At the street bulletins there were many arguments, incipient scraps and continuous waging. One Irishman on Yonge-street with limited information at the 19th mile took \$20 to \$14 and wanted more. The crowd stayed to the finish at Massey Hall and when the crucial period came there was a extreme contention, the crowd failing to connect the story of the running as told by Roy Irving with Shrubb's sudden collapse. Then the throng showed its color. There was a great majority of the 2000 present supporters of Longboat and they cheered so that the other side will never forget it.
