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HENLEY RACE RULES CHANGED.

Important Alterations Made in English Regatta Events.

LONDON, July 18.—Important changes have been made in the rules governing the English Henley regatta. The following alterations to existing rules, recommended by the committee of management, was adopted:

No crew or member of a crew shall be entered for the Ladies' Challenge Plate and for the Thames Challenge Cup at the same regatta, such crew or member thereof of entered for both such races, shall, before the draw for heats and stations, be required to declare to the committee of management, in which of the two races such crew or member thereof will compete.

A similar alteration will be made in the qualification rules for the Thames Challenge Cup. The stewards fixed the joint entry for the two events at £7 12s 6d, instead of £10 10s as previously.

Apparently the object of the recent meeting of the stewards was to curtail the program, which in recent years has been of such length, chiefly owing to the numerous entries for the Ladies' Plate and Thames Cup, as to necessitate a four days' regatta. Thus the expenses have been considerably increased without any proportionate increase in the receipts.

The alteration is regarded with favor among the principal rowing clubs around London, who are debarred from competing for the Ladies' Plate and Thames Cup, altho they frequently have to row against college crews competing for the ladies' eight.

Thus the change will tend to bring the competing crews more in line, and the racing should thereby be an improvement upon previous years.

ENGLAND HAS JOHNSON RIVAL.

British Heavy-Weight is Touted as White Man's Hope.

LONDON, July 18.—Eugene Corbi, the most noted fight referee in England and who refereed the Burns-Moir championship fight, when asked if he thought it possible to find a man capable of beating Johnson, replied: "I believe it is. There is a man down at South End, where I live, who has a great chance, in my opinion. His name is Eugene Corbi. He was formerly in the army and has just returned from India and was trained while there by Major Loney, an American, and beat every man he met."

"Wells has a longer reach than Johnson, stands 6 feet 3 inches, and for a heavy-weight is wonderfully quick on his feet. He is 21 years old and his last match was with Gunner MacMurray, whom he knocked out in half a round. His next match is with Jim Maher of America."

"Packer McFarland, who saw Wells beat MacMurray, said to me, 'Mr. Corbi continued. I wish we had him out in America. I believe we could train him to become the champion.'"
