New Rates of Independent Foresters

The new rates of the I. O. F. will be of interest to the many members of the order in London. The rates are increased by an average of 65 per cent.

In brief the plan is to re-rate the old members at the age of entry on the schedule just adopted. The re-rating will commence in October.

If a member cannot pay the extra assessment, he can borrow the difference from the order, and it will be cent interest.

Mr. Armstrong (East Lambton) wanted to know if the Minister of Militia ever erected armouries in constituencies opposed to the Government.
