Albany, Jan. 2.—The famous Niagara Lockport and Ontario Power Company measure, which was classed as one of the great "grab" bills of the last session, and which, after passing the legislature, was vetoed by Governor Odell in a caustic public statement, will be reintroduced at the present session, but in a much amended fashion, designed, it is said, to meet many, if not all, of the objections raised at its last appearance. This was learned from Assemblyman Thompson of Niagara.

"I do not know," he said to-night, "whether it will be a question of special or general legislation. If it is general it will be along the lines of the Merritt bill of last year, which provided for a general power transmission enactment. In any event, the measure will be much amended. Shortness of time prevented our meeting the ob-
