

SOLDIERS NOW HAVE A REGULAR PLACE

"A Place to Go," Is an Attractive, Well-Fitted Club.

OTHERS BEING STARTED

Clubhouse Is Bound to Be Scene of Many Merry Gatherings.

"A place to go." Such is the phrase that has been adopted for the new Soldiers' Club which was introduced to the soldiers Friday night by a huge free concert from which hundreds were turned away. The sold Liederkrantz, on west Richmond street, from now on echo with the voices of hundreds of soldiers, veterans and recruits, who have been provided with a place all for themselves, which will rival any club in the city for completeness of equipment.

Without even the knowledge of the military authorities, the Sportsman's and Athletic Association has gone ahead, and despite numerous obstacles, opened this soldiers' haven. There have been no committee meetings, not even any committees, while there is not even any organization in the strict sense of the word. If anything was to be done, somebody did it and told the others, who assented. It was in this manner that the work of getting the former German clubhouses into order was done.

Home Was Never Like This. The new Soldiers' Club will be a soldiers' home. The house "rules" say: "Make it your home; it belongs to you."

"Write your letters, and have your mail addressed there; it is yours." "Play pool or billiards."

"Get a shave. It will cost you two tickets."

"Have a wash or take a bath. There are lots of towels and soap."

"Invite your friends and even read the newspapers and magazines."

"Play cards, chess, checkers, or any other game you want. If it isn't here it will be procured for you."

"Put on the gloves. There are plenty of them."

"Arrange concerts or other parties; the assembly hall is at your service."

"Free moving pictures and concerts are provided at intervals."

"Discharged soldiers may obtain jobs thru the secretary. Leave your name and address with him."

"This is a soldiers' club, run by soldiers for soldiers, and any suggestions from soldiers will be heartily welcome."

These house "rules" breathe the spirit of the club from beginning to end. There is to be no discipline. It is to be the one spot where the men will be able to "blow off steam," as one of its sponsors laughingly remarked, and a Victoria has many donations.

Study has several hundred donated volumes, which may be read and borrowed by the soldiers. Newspapers and magazines, both fiction, engineering and trade and mechanical, have been dotted around by the hundreds.

So many donations of magazines and other reading matter have been made that the club is to be made a regular clearing house and all extra magazines each month will either be sent to the Exhibition or to the front for the boys in the trenches.

Big Hall for Entertainments. There are ten pool and billiard tables in the basement, and four shower baths with a barber shop. On the ground floor there are two large reading and card rooms, each of which will accommodate about one hundred men. In connection with this there is also a lunch counter, from which all kinds of good things to eat, drink and smoke will be sold. On the first floor is an assembly hall with stage and dancing floor, which will be at the service of the men at all times. It is the intention to allow each battalion and unit to use this hall on its own night, when they may put on their own entertainments for their own men.

A moving-picture machine and operator have been donated by a local film concern, who have also promised a free film service whenever it is wanted.

On the second floor beside the gallery to the main auditorium there is a sergeant's mess, a lunch counter, such as that below, is provided here exclusively for the N.C.O.'s.

The clubhouse is to be absolutely free, and yet is expected to finance itself. Tickets will be sold at about twenty-five cents, which will be worth five cents each in any part of the building. Cigars, cigarettes and tobacco will be sold at standard prices, which by using the tickets means a twenty per cent reduction. Billiards will be charged for at a tickets a game, six tickets an hour. Food will be similarly sold.

It is expected that the whole club will be self-supporting, and may even show a profit. If the balance at the end of six months is on the right side,

the surplus will be evenly divided among the local regiments for any purpose they may wish. If there is a deficit the Sportsman's Patriotic Association will pocket the loss.

Clubs Started in Other Cities. The Sportsman's Patriotic Association did not dishonor after the fight picture controversy, except in an official way. On the other hand, the small group of men behind it, R. H. Green, Tom Blumquist, P. J. Mulcaugh, Frederick Lyonde, Jerry Shea, and a number of others, got down to work all the time, and as individuals, not the thing going. Not satisfied with what they have already done, they have started similar clubs on their way in Hamilton, London and Kingston, where the idea has been received by the local sportsman with enthusiasm.

Lieut. Taylor, who is at present in charge of the local club, has managed the few days he has been at work to carry out the desires of all the individual sponsors, until now Toronto has a Soldiers' Club that in its origin and management is certainly without a double anywhere in the world.

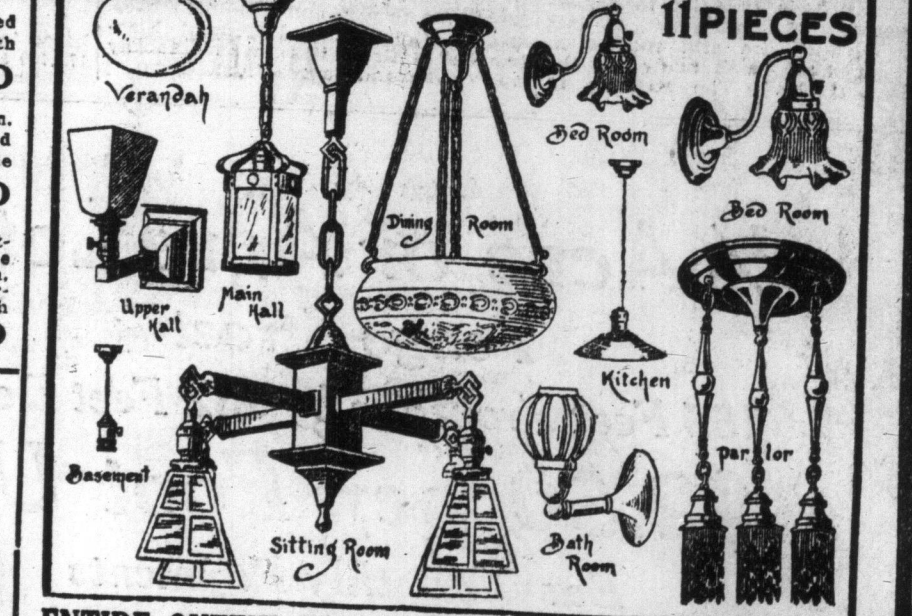

Out of a staff of less than forty, the Star Theatre has had 21 men join the colors. PROF. WILGAR IS CALLED FROM QUEEN'S To Instruct Engineers at Ottawa

KINGSTON, Nov. 6.—Another sacrifice has been made by Queen's University in the giving up of Professor Wilgar to serve the militia department in Ottawa. He is head of the civil engineering department. Last year he was commissioned as captain and put in charge of the Depot Company of the 50th P.C.C.E. at Barrfield Camp. He was promoted to major of the company, and in his several capacities in the military field proved so efficient that the militia authorities have seen fit to call him to Ottawa for duty there. Major Wilgar will be attached to the instructional staff at the Engineers' training depot, and as such will be actively

occupied in the training of officers for the Engineers for overseas duty. He will be succeeded by C. T. S. Scott, who lately has been president of a large contracting firm in Vancouver, B.C. Mr. Scott is at the moment a Queen's man, having taken the degree of B.A. '04 and B.Sc. '07. He was very much interested in sports while here at Queen's and was a crack half-back on the Rugby team. Since leaving Queen's Mr. Scott served as assistant city engineer of Toronto, assistant engineer of the hydro-electric development at Niagara Falls, and was also superintendent of construction on the T. & N.O. Railway.
