This is What Wayne County, N. Y. Jury Will Be Asked to A MOTHER'S DEVOTION Determine-Young Woman Charged With Killing Her Indians Near Lake Nipigon Were Husband After a Quarrel-

Defence Will Claim Suicide Lyons, N. Y., April 5th—Calmly asserting her innocence and belief in her ultimate acquittal, Mrs. Georgia Allyn Sampson, was placed on trial today before Justice Adelbert T. Rich, of the Supreme Court, on a charge of shooting and killing her husband, Harry Sampson, a nephew of Admiral Sampson, at the Allyn homestead, near Macedon, N. Y., on last November 1.
