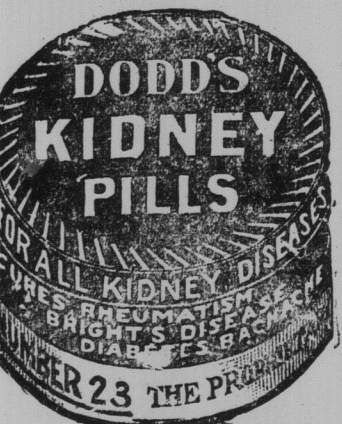

**SAYS CHAMPION WILL MAKE WEIGHT**  
New York, July 11.—"Benny Leonard will be practically 130 at ringside when he meets Johnny Kilbane at Philadelphia on July 25," declares Billy Gibson.  
"On account of the great New York crowd that will make the trip that night the promoters have agreed to have the men in the ring ready for action at nine o'clock," says Gibson. "As Benny will have to be at 188 at eight o'clock you can readily see that he will not be half a pound over that mark at nine. It is the intention of the promoters to have the bout over and the New York crowd back home before midnight. The men are getting the largest guarantee ever offered two men for a bout in Philadelphia. We expect to double the remarkable gates drawn by Battling Nelson and Terry McGovern and Stanley Ketchel and Sam Langford. They hovered around \$20,000.  
"About Benny's weight," mused Gibson. "There is a silly notion abroad that he has had trouble making 133. As a matter of fact, he has made weight but four times in his career. He got on the scales for Kilbane, Dundee, Wallace and Kansas. He didn't have to worry about the notch required, for he always has been a light boy."

**Nelson Earned \$350,000 in Ring**  
Former Light Weight Champion  
Amassed a Fortune in a Few Years  
Oscar (Battling) Matthew Nelson, former lightweight champion of the world, was born in Copenhagen, Denmark, in 1882. Nelson entered the ring at seventeen, and was the victor in all of his early battles, suffering but two defeats in the first four years in the ring. Joe Headmark and Eddie Santry were the victors on these melancholy occasions.  
In 1904 Nelson began to take on the top-notchers, and defeated Eddie Hanlon, Aureli Herrera and Young Corbett, but lost to Jimmy Britt. In 1905 he knocked out Belt and the following year he lost to Joe Gans on a foul in the fourth round. In 1908 the Dane achieved the championship goal by putting Gans to sleep and repeated in a return match. He lost the title to Wolf-gast in 1910 and since then he has been whipped by second and third raters. He earned about \$350,000 during his ring career.
