SPORT NEWS OF THE DAY HOME AND ABROAD

BASEBALL
National League Ended
The National League 1917 season was brought to a close in Brooklyn yesterday when the home team of the Boston Braves split even in a double header. The first game went to the Dodgers 5 to 1 and the Bostonians clinched the second 4 to 2.

American League Closes
Washington defeated the Red Sox in their last game of the American League series yesterday by a score of 5 to 4.

St. Louis Nationals Win
St. Louis Nationals won the second game of the city series yesterday when they held their American League opponents to one run and six hits. The score was 3 to 1.

Collins in Fifth Series
During the coming world's series Eddie Collins, the Chicago White Sox captain, will enter the lucky group which has participated in the spoils of five world's series. However, Eddie will have to get in one more series after this one to tie Jack Barry's record of six world's series pots, all but one of them being the winner's end.

During the world's series of 1910, 1911, 1913, 1914, 1915 and 1916 Barry took in \$18,511.80. By the time Collins gets through with the 1917 series he also will have a nice world's series bank account. He already has received \$10,505.80 in his four series. Despite the fact that only double the regular price will be charged in Chicago the players' divvy this year will again be very large.

Next to Barry the player who has won the most world's series money is Jack Coombs now with the Brooklyn. Coombs has been on three winners and two losers and has taken in \$13,020.70. Last fall his check as a member of the losing Brooklyn was \$2,715.40.

In 1908 the victorious Cubs only received individual checks for \$1,317.58, while the losing Athletics in 1905 received only \$382 apiece from the commission. However, the club threw in its share and each player received \$322. That shows how the world's series pots have grown.

Other players who have taken part in five series are Harry Davis, Danny Murphy, Chief Bender and Eddie Plank, all of whom went through with Connie Mack. Ira Thomas got into one series in Detroit and four with the Athletics, while Johnny Evers got into four with the Cubs and one with the Braves.

Few of these players drew as much in their five series as did the Boston Red Sox players, who fought through the three victorious campaigns of 1912, 1915 and 1916. For these three series Hooper, Lewis, Cady, Thomas, Gardner, Henriksen and Heinie Wagner drew in \$11,028.50, \$4,222 in 1912, \$3,780.25 in 1915 and \$3,820.25 in 1916. They were pots worth while.

BOWLING
Holiday Match Arranged
Black's bowling alleys will be auspiciously opened for the season on Oct. 18 on Thanksgiving Day. In the morning two teams will clash; one is to be captained by Walter Gambin and the other by A. Covey. The former will have as his colleagues H. Sullivan, B. Ferguson, D. Foshay and T. Jenkins, and the latter will have W. Riley, E. Maxwell, A. Beatty and A. Burs. These teams are fairly even matched and a good game is anticipated.

The alleys have undergone extensive repairs and have been placed in first class condition by a representative of the Brunswick-Balke-Collender Company of New York. They are conceded to be as fast as any in Canada and some high scores are expected to be made during the playing season. The Canadian single string record was made on Black's by Vincent Kelly in 1915, when he ran up a score of 176 in a championship match.
