NEW DIRECTORS OF BANK OF MONTREAL

Capt. H. Molson and H. Kennedy
on Board—Emphasis on Econ-
omy

Two vacancies on the board of direc-
tors of the Bank of Montreal were filled
on Monday, while at a subsequent
meeting of the directors the office of vice-
president of the bank, which has been
vacant for several years, was also filled.
The new directors are Captain Herbert
Molson of Montreal and Harold Kennedy of
Quebec. C. B. Gordon becomes vice-
president of the bank.

All three elections will be viewed with
satisfaction, not only by the sharehold-
ers and customers of the bank, but by
the larger public to whom the policy
pursued by an institution of national
ramifications like the Bank of Montreal
becomes a matter of general interest.
Capt. Molson is well known here. Mr.
Kennedy is the head of a large lumber
enterprise and is an authority on the in-
dustry. Both are representative of large
commercial interests; the bank in due
course will benefit by the ability and the
vigour with which they have applied
themselves to their own enterprises.

C. B. Gordon's advancement in finan-
cial as well as commercial affairs has
been extremely rapid. It is only within
the past few years that he became a choice
for seat on the board of directors of the
Bank of Montreal. How well he must
have fulfilled his duties is clearly enough
indicated by the action of his fellow
members of the board in electing him to
the vice-presidency. The successful con-
solidation of cotton manufacturing inter-
ests known as the Dominion Textile Co.,
of which Mr. Gordon was and is the ac-
tive manager, dates back only eleven years.
In the interval Mr. Gordon has been
called to the directorates of many im-
portant concerns, financial and commer-
cial, and recently, at the request of the
government, he has been assisting in the
organization and direction of the vast
munitions business of Canada as a mem-
ber of the Imperial Munitions Board.

The addresses of the president and
vice-president present analyses of condi-
tions as they exist today, with discus-
sions of problems that lie in the future,
which will command thoughtful atten-
tion throughout the country. Conditions
created by war demands which have re-
sulted in the conversion of an unfavor-
able trade balance, with a rapid rise in
bank deposits in Canada, are likely to
continue for some months at least.

"Trade conditions at the moment in
Canada are buoyant in nearly all lines
of business," remarked Sir Vincent Mer-
edith. And later, "It seems probable that
for some months to come orders for
munitions and war supplies will continue
to keep our industrial plants actively em-
ployed."

"A temporary check in business gener-
ally may be looked for when peace is in
sight, but I do not anticipate that any
lengthened cessation of our commercial
and industrial activities will immedi-
ately ensue. The period of reconstruction
will probably not be accomplished for
several months and, during this time
Europe should provide a market for all
we can produce, and new markets, per-
haps, will be opened to us, which we
have never yet been able to reach."

Both addresses refer in one way or an-
other to three main objects which Cana-
dians should hold in view; economy in
public and private life; the imme-
diate and subsequent burdens of the
war may be met; production, that ex-
ports may be increased and the home

FAILURES IN NOVEMBER

The business mortality in Canada, as
in the United States, shows continued re-
duction in comparison with recent pre-
ceding years, November failures making
the best exhibit for the period since 1912.
Strictly commercial defaults last month,
as reported by R. C. Dun & Co., num-
bered 112 and supplied liabilities of \$1,
012,802, against 217 for \$4,898,101 in
1915, no fewer than \$20,1214 for \$7,
083,709 and 199 in 1913 for \$1,768,256.
The record for 1912 showed ninety-nine
suspensions, involving \$1,089,044.

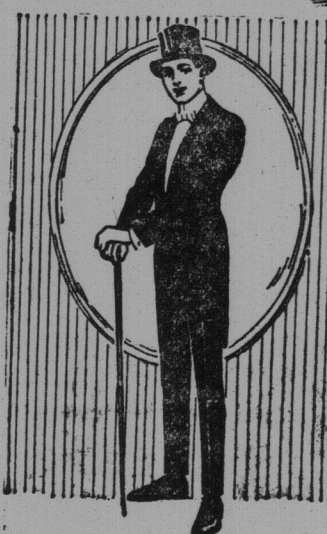
The Chandler Motor Co. has declared
