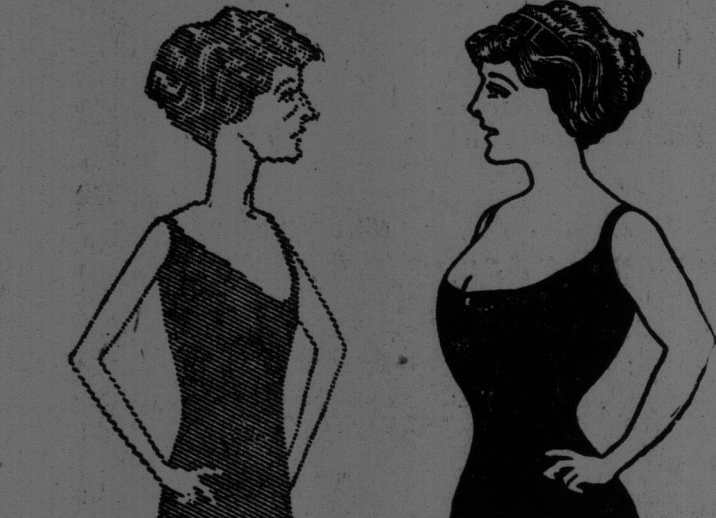

T. D. FRAWLEY MARRIED?

Daughter of Mantell on Stage; Charlotte Walker in "Two-day." Local Players: Pictures and Their Players; General Stage News

Those who recall him and his playing in St. John will be interested to learn from Los Angeles papers the story that T. Daniel Frawley, stage director for Oliver Morosco, and Peggy O'Neil, playing in "Peg o' My Heart," were secretly wed. Both deny the report. Theatrical friends say they are married.

Frawley is credited with having made a star out of Miss O'Neil. The book is by Pordes-Milo and Hermann Haller, while Walter Kollo has written the music. The story deals with the exploits of a famous barn.

An educational little theatre is planned for Cincinnati, whose prime objective is training for the stage of people of offices and factories who are of unusual dramatic ability and limited means. K. L. Dietz, student of Eben and Reinhardt, former director of the Orpheum stock company, now instructor of the Cincinnati School of Expression, is the originator of the idea. Dietz will consult officials of the Chamber of Commerce and the city fathers regarding the raising of a fund to start his project. Dietz says he can run the theatre for a year for \$100,000, which is to be subscribed by Harry M. Levy and others. When students become successful on the professional stage they must agree to reimburse the proposed training school and theatre for the free instruction. Dietz will pattern his institution after the free theatres of Paris and St. Petersburg.

The new lessees who are incorporated as the Waybrook Company, plan a radical change of policy, the new order to be inaugurated today.

Musical Events
The engagement of the Boston Symphony Orchestra to give a dozen concerts at the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco during the latter half of the next season, has been announced. It has been attempted by an orchestra of the United States. The contract provides that the entire orchestra will be taken, his conductor, be taken direct to San Francisco and return direct to Boston, giving no concerts on the way out or on the way back. It is planned that

the orchestra will leave Boston on May 9. Madame Melba is planning an extensive tour of the United States with her concert company for next season under the direction of C. A. Ellis of Boston. She will begin at the Maine Festival at the end of September and now purposes giving between thirty and forty concerts.

Geraldine Farrar has put herself for next year exclusively under the management of Charles A. Ellis of Boston who is to give her a most extensive concert tour to begin in October and continue until the end of the season, covering the larger cities of the United States.

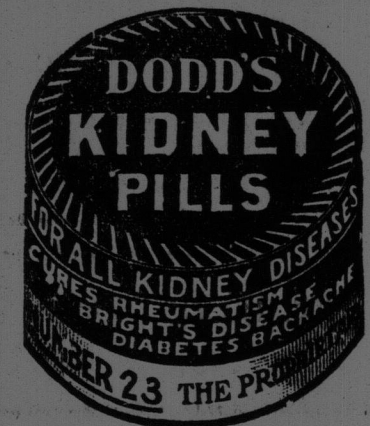
