**Big Invasion By Feds.**  
Chicago, July 16—New territory will be invaded by the Federal league next season, says James A. Gilmore, president of the organization in confirming the report that the league's headquarters will be moved from Chicago to New York city within the next two weeks. Plans are being made for a new circuit in 1916 and clubs may be launched in Detroit, Boston or Cleveland. It already has been decided upon, he says, to place a club in New York city. "We are going to place a club in New York city next year and as this will entail a lot of additional work for this office I thought it best to move here now. **AQUATIC.**  
Resolute Will Defend Cup.  
New York, July 15—J. Pierpont Morgan was aboard his yacht the Corsair this afternoon on Sandy Hook and saw the race between the Resolute and the Vanitie. The Resolute won by nineteen seconds actual time and one minute and thirty seconds corrected time. This was the third and deciding race to select the defender of America's cup against Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock IV.

**When Sir Thomas Lipton issued his challenge for the America Cup orders were issued for three yachts to defend the cup and one of them was the Defiance, designed by George Owen and built by the Beth Shipyard for the so-called Tri-City Syndicate, composed of prominent yachtmen of Boston, New York and Philadelphia.**

**The Defiance left the builder's yard as soon as she was completed and was taken to Greenough, Conn., without having any trials in water near where she was built. Here's was the most lofty rig of any of the trio—high mainmast, and her hull was beautifully built of mahogany on metal frames, or what is known as composite construction.**

**She was sailed by George M. Pynchon, her managing officer. E. Walter Clark of Philadelphia and Capt. Selah B. Howland of the Defiance acted as juries.**

**She sailed for New York City, where she was to race for the America Cup.**
