CANADA NAMES TWO PLAYERS FOR DAVIS CUP COMPETITION

TWO OTHERS TO BE NOMINATED STRIBLING WON FOR CUP PLAY FROM SLATTERY

Jack Wright And Willard Crocker, of Montreal, Will Play

TORONTO, Ont., March 25.—Willard F. Crocker and Jack A. Wright, of Montreal, have been chosen to represent Canada in the Davis Cup competition to be played this year. The two Montreal tennis stars were selected by the council of the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association, which has not yet decided as to the selection of the other two players necessary to complete the team.

Canada is drawn to play against Cuba in the first round, which owing to the small number of nations entered in this zone, is also the semi-final round, and if successful, will meet Japan, provided the latter defeated the Philippine Islands. The winner of Canada vs. Japan will be called on to play the winner of the European zone.

Entry Blanks For Swimming Meet Here

W. E. Striling, senior vice-president of the M. P. B. A. U. of C., announced last evening that he had received entry blanks from the C. C. J. A. club at Montreal for the Maritime amateur indoor swimming championships, which will be held in the railway city on April 23.

The program for the senior events will comprise 25, 50, 100 and 220 yards, free style; 25 yards, breast stroke; 25 yards, back stroke, and a plunge for distance.

The junior events will be, for boys under 12, 25 yards, free stroke; under 15, 25, 50 yards, free stroke; under 16, 50 yards, free stroke, and under 18, 100 yards, free stroke.

MEDALS AND TROPHY.

Gold and silver medals will be presented to the winners in each event. A trophy will also be donated to the team securing the highest number of points. The championships are under the sanction of the M. P. B. A. U. of C., and the rules of the Amateur Swimming Association of Canada are to govern.

CLIMAX COMES IN LAST MINUTE

Clancy Ties For Ottawa in Hard Fight For Hockey Championship

MONTREAL, March 25.—National Hockey League hockey for the season will go to the team winning the game at the capital tomorrow night when the Ottawa Senators and the Montreal Maroons clash in the second battle of the league play-offs. The two teams will enter the deciding tussle on an even footing, due to the one goal deadlock which marked the opening tilt of the two game series at the Forum last night.

Montreal's hopes of carrying a one goal lead into the final fight for the crown received a setback in one of the most dramatic finishes to mark an H. L. play down contest. With but ten seconds of the match remaining to be played and Montreal leading a one goal margin, King Clancy, square jawed, aggressive and indomitable defender of the Senators, cupped a night of brilliant hockey by curving a vicious shot from the Maroon defence, which swerved into the side of Benedict and lodged in the corner of the net to tie the count for Ottawa.

The goal stunned the Maroon supporters and they quickly fled from the rink, dashed by the sudden turn of fortune, while a solid and faithful band of Ottawa rooters jumped around their little section of the rink in frantic abandon, wildly cheering the courageous Clancy and his team mates, who had turned a prospect which was viewed with apprehension, into a situation which could be regarded with much more optimism by the Senators and their followers.

DRAMATIC CLIMAX

It was a dramatic climax to one of the most thrilling, rugged games witnessed here this season. The tally to Clancy's credit could not have fallen on more able shoulders for the king played one of the greatest games of his already brilliant hockey career.

PETERSBURG, Fla., March 25.—Three years ago this spring when Myles Thomas reported to the Yankee training camp to show his stuff, he was assigned to a room and a uniform, and then was lost in the shuffle. The Yanks were riding the high road and heading in the International, and then was sold to the Toronto club of that circuit.

WILL TRY TO STANDARDIZE HOCKEY RULES

Amateur Teams Have Trouble Keeping Players; Committees Appointed

MONTREAL, March 25.—President Frank Calder of the National Hockey League was present at yesterday's session of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association meeting, at the invitation of President Quilty of the C. A. H. A. to talk with the delegates about a possible standardization of the rules of hockey. It was finally decided to appoint a committee from the C. A. H. A. to meet a similar one from the N. H. L., following the annual meeting of the latter organization.

The so-called American hockey situation was discussed and it was felt that a modification of the present rules, which keeps a Canadian player from re-entering Canadian hockey after playing in the States, for one year after his return to Canada, would help the migration situation.
