

FOUR SELECTED IN CHARLOTTE

Provincial Opposition Party
Holds Two Conventions
in St. Stephen

Flewelling for New Constitu-
ency; Taylor, Gupitill and
Lord for County.

ST. STEPHEN, June 24.—John M. Flewelling, M. L. A., was unanimously chosen as the Opposition candidate for the new constituency of St. Stephen-Milltown in the coming provincial election held here today. Immediately following this convention another for Charlotte county was held which selected as Opposition candidates Dr. H. I. Taylor, M. L. A., St. George, Scott D. Gupitill, M. L. A., Grand Manan, and James S. Lord, of St. Stephen, a new man.

Resolutions were passed at the county convention expressing appreciation of the work of the three Opposition members in the Legislature for the last five years, regretting the illness and absence of Mr. Flewelling, who is in Montreal taking medical treatment, voicing gratitude to C. D. Richards, M. L. A., Opposition House leader, and expressing approval of the policy of the new party leader, Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., M. P.

LARGELY ATTENDED.

Dr. Baxter delivered an address in which he criticized the present Liberal Government for its stand on the Grand Falls hydro-electric development and denounced its alleged extravagance.

The new candidate is a native of Deer Island. He was a former teacher in the Saint John schools and is now general agent for Charlotte county for the Canada Life Insurance Company.

Both conventions were largely attended and enthusiastic. They were held in the Queen Theatre. Practically every seat in the theatre was taken, delegates coming from all parts of the county as well as many enthusiastic followers of the Opposition.

NEW CONSTITUENCY.

The first convention to be called was that of the new Milltown-St. Stephen constituency. Arthur D. Ganong was chairman with G. H. I. Cockburn as secretary.

As Mr. Flewelling is at present in a Montreal hospital, where he is under the care of a specialist, his acceptance of the nomination was made by Arthur R. MacKenzie, who, in a touching address, expressed the appreciation he knew Mr. Flewelling would feel when he heard the result of today's convention.

COUNTY CONVENTION.

The county convention was next held. By this time the theatre was packed. Many women were present. A. D. Ganong was again in the chair. He called on Dr. Baxter and A. D. Holroyd, provincial organizer, to come to the platform which they did amid cheers.

Chairman Ganong said it gave him much pleasure, as it must everyone, to see so many present. This meeting was not only for nominations but for the purpose of organizing, too. He then called for the appointment of a chairman from the county. On motion Thomas A. Hartt, of St. Andrews, was chosen as chairman.

Mr. Hartt, in a few words, withdrew his name and no other nomination being received, the chairman declared Dr. Taylor and Messrs. Gupitill and Lord the three county candidates. The theatre rang with cheers as these men took their places on the platform.

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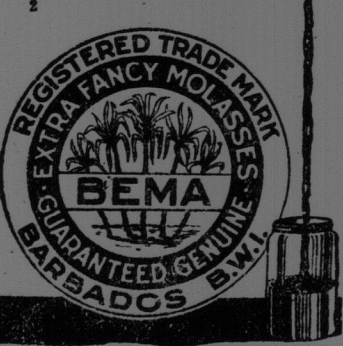
