

COMPANY ASKS FOR \$500,000 STOCK ISSUE

purpose of providing funds for extension and betterment already planned for. Your petitioner therefore prays that your honorable board may approve of said proposed issue and may make an order granting authority upon such terms as it may deem advisable for such proposed issue, and may grant to your petitioner a certificate in accordance with such order.

NO RATE INCREASE

The report of Mr. Midram was presented to the chairman. In explanation of the report Mr. Midram said the company in making the application was following the practice followed by practically all utility companies today of making improvements and extension and financing them by bank loans or from reserve until these extensions were earning money and this allowed them to issue the stock without any danger of increasing the rate to the subscriber.

He found that the company owed the bank at the present time \$190,000 and this would be retired from the proceeds of the stock sale. The company were amply justified in asking for an issue of \$500,000 as they would have spent by the end of the year, for their whole budget was completed, over \$300,000 in plant extension and improvement. The value of the plant and equipment was \$3,389,564 and the stock issued amounted to \$2,969,410.

CAPITALIZATION LOW

The capitalization of the Company was low, being \$127 per average station as compared with \$175 in Nova Scotia and \$190 in Massachusetts. He felt the application was reasonable and should be granted.

Mr. Carter said he was in accord with what Mr. Midram had said and would not go over it again. He cited two cases in which it had been held that an application such as that of the Company was justified and where judgment had been in favor of the utility.

Mr. Kelley said he was not hostile to the application but on behalf of the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities would like some information. Mr. Midram had given the Company a line certificate of character but the people generally did not see eye to eye with him. They agreed that good service was being given but they felt that it was being well-paid for.

STATEMENT QUESTIONED

He questioned the statement of Mr. Midram that we were getting the He asked what the reserve of the Company was and was informed by Mr. Midram that it was \$17,589.47 of which amount \$21,000 was in government bonds and the balance had been used for improvements and extensions.

He asked how Mr. Midram figured there would not be any increase in rates if the issue was authorized and Mr. Midram said he was satisfied that because of the fact that the improvements and extensions were already earning and would take care of the dividend.

Mr. Kelley said the only stock that it was intended to issue at once was enough to pay off the bank loan of \$190,000.

Mr. Kelley asked why it would not be possible to issue bonds for the amount. Mr. Midram said this would not be feasible as the interest and sinking fund would amount to more than the dividend on the stock.

It was better practice, he said, to have only one class of security to deal with when comparing assets and liabilities, and he felt it was good business for the company to sell stock instead of bonds.

POSTPONEMENT ASKED

Mr. Kelley said he was going to ask the board to set the case over until he had had an opportunity to secure certain information and look it over.

Mr. Carter objected to delay, as the company wished to issue the stock at once. He said Mr. Kelley had been told he could examine the books of the company, and if he had not the information required it was his own fault.

The chairman said he thought the request of Mr. Kelley for time was a reasonable one, and the board themselves would want to study the report of Mr. Midram before pronouncing judgment. Mr. Kelley suggested that the hearing be postponed until January 1. This was protested against by Mr. Carter, who said the money was needed at once. Mr. Trueman said if the company had waited until the last moment it was their fault and the board could not be rushed.

Mr. Carter said Mr. Midram had made an investigation and found the request of the company was justified. Mr. Trueman said the feeling of the board was that the company were entitled to have the money, but it was a question whether it should be raised by the sale of stock or bonds.

The Board of Public Utilities this morning ordered the New Brunswick Power Company to put on a bus service from the end of the present street car lines in East Saint John to Lee's Corner for the winter months. The extension of the street car lines to the West Saint John car service and the application of the Power Company for a new rate for water supplied by the extension of the street car lines to Lee's Corner, Simonds, until the December meeting.

The chairman suggested an adjournment until Friday morning.

The chairman said this was hardly fair to the small holder, as many of them did not hold a sufficient number of shares to get any of the new issue. Mr. Robinson said the company would in future adopt the fractional share privilege and this would give the small investor a better chance.

INTEREST QUESTION

E. S. Carter said the selling of these 50,000 shares would mean an additional \$200,000 on which the subscriber would have to pay 8 per cent. This was challenged by the chairman, who pointed out that no interest was paid on the amount above par. Mr. Carter said the selling at par did mean that the company had to issue that much more stock to get the money they needed.

Mr. Robinson said the term market value was rather a loose one, and he doubted very much if any one could take the stock to the bank and borrow on more than the par value. He thought it was a good thing for the province that it had at least one corporation whose stock was quoted above par.

The chairman suggested that the hearing be adjourned until one week from today, but Mr. Kelley said he would be out of the city at that time, and the chairman, after consultation with the other members of the board announced that it would adjourn until Friday of this week at 10.30 in the morning.
