

SWIMMER KILLED IN FLORIDA WATERS

Girl Who Lived in Montreal Two Years Ago Frightfully Slashed.

St. Petersburg, Fla., June 21—A giant barracuda, known to Florida fishermen as the "tiger of sea," attacked and killed Dorothy McLatchie, eighteen years old, member of the state championship swimming team of the St. Petersburg High School.

The tragedy occurred late in the afternoon while Miss McLatchie was swimming in the shallow channel of Tampa Bay opposite this city in company with her chum, Mary Buhner, seventeen, also a member of the championship team.

Miss Buhner, at the risk of her own life, held her companion with one arm while with the other she signalled to the shore, half a mile away, for help.

Miss McLatchie received nearly a score of wounds on her body from the ferocious barracuda. An artery of her left leg was severed, and she bled to death in a few minutes after the attack.

It is the first tragedy of the kind ever reported in Florida waters. The presence of barracuda in Tampa Bay is unusual, but it is supposed the fish were patrolling the channel in the wake of a Tampa-bound gulf steamer in search of food.

The two girls started about 6.30 o'clock on a practice swim to a buoy a mile and a half from shore. There course is one often followed as one of the "stunts" performed by local swimmers. No one, least of all the two champion swimmers, who had brought considerable fame to St. Petersburg by reason of their prowess in the water, anticipated any untoward occurrence.

The swimmers had reached the channel buoy and were on the return trip when the Buhner girl was startled to see her companion suddenly disappear. In a moment she came to the surface gasping: "I've been bitten; I think my foot is gone."

Almost immediately the water about her was stained with blood. The Buhner girl plunged toward her companion and caught her about the shoulders.

"Kiss me, Mazy, I'm dying," were the only words Dorothy McLatchie uttered. She collapsed in the arms of her chum, who needed all her swimming knowledge to keep afloat. The barracuda made no further attack.

Miss Buhner screamed aloud and waved her arm in an effort to call help from the pier, half a mile away. Her cries were faintly heard by men on the dock, who ran back to the shore and got a motorboat. The rescue was made difficult by the high seas that were running, the waves concealing the Buhner girl.

For more than half an hour Mary Buhner held the burden of her stricken chum afloat and was herself completely exhausted when the two forms were dragged into the motorboat.

The barracuda had made frightful gashes in the left leg and hip of the McLatchie. Thirteen triangular marks of the fish's teeth were visible on her body, besides a gash fourteen inches long in the thigh and another thirteen inches around the left calf. It was these marks that determined the identity of the attacking fish.

MUCH WINTER WHEAT TO MOVE EASTWARD

Will be Shipped from Atlantic Seaboard Rather Than from Gulf Ports.

Chicago, June 21—Indications are that the wheat crop of the Middle West, which is marketed soon after harvest, will move largely to Chicago and St. Louis and to the East the coming season rather than to New Orleans, as for several years past. Leading States east of the Missouri River have the promise of 198,000,000 bushels, or 78,000,000 bushels more than harvested last year, which more than offsets the loss of 30,000,000 bushels in Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma, as shown by the government report.

The crop west of the Missouri River generally moves to Galveston and New Orleans for export, and more than 85,000,000 bushels of wheat have already been sold abroad. Some exporters estimate the sales much higher, but there has been considerable speculative export business, with sales from one exporter to another, which help to swell the figures.

NARCOTIC ADDICT CAUSED 2 DEATHS

Confesses to Murder of Man and Fatal Attack on Girl.

Chicago, June 21—Trembling and shaking, Henry Deyo, alias Wilson, confessed to killing Henry J. Menett, sales manager of the R. and J. Dick Company, whose body, with a bullet wound through the head, was found Tuesday in the basement of the company's office at 63 West Lake street.

Immediately following this confession he made a second admission—that he had tried to attack Miss Sigma Sundall last April, when the girl, fleeing from his attack, leaped to her death from the third story of a house in Grand avenue where she was living.

Deyo, who confessed to using narcotics, said he had been employed by Menett nine days when, on the morning of the murder he had gone down early and, finding Menett's keys in the outer vestibule, entered the company's office.

"I found Menett's revolver in the drawer of his desk," said Deyo. "The chair had been thrown around, and I figured he was drunk downstairs and had money on him. I had seen him carry money before."

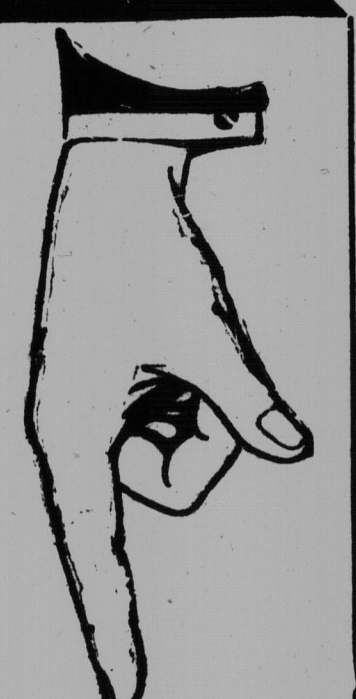

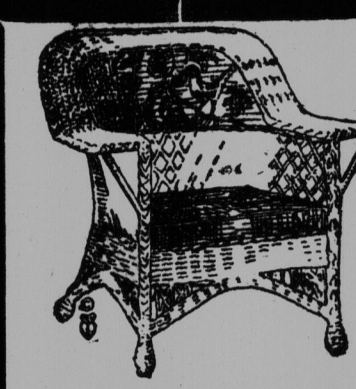

PAY TRIBUTE TO HON. W. S. FIELDING

Members Join in Felicitations to Finance Minister on His Fortieth Political Birthday.

Ottawa, Ont., June 20—Before the house met this afternoon, Liberal members of the house gathered together to pay tribute to Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, for his forty years of faithful service in public life.

In their behalf, Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, prime minister presented to Mr. Fielding a solid silver tea service and, in so doing spoke of the splendid qualities of mind and heart shown by Mr. Fielding during his public career.

He spoke of Mr. Fielding's love for his native province of Nova Scotia, for Canada, for the empire and his good will for the United States, "which has found expression in your many valiant efforts to bring about close reciprocal relations in trade" which, "we believe to be the advantage of both countries, if indeed, not also a gain to the cause of higher civilization itself."

"The country, not less than yourself," the prime minister concluded, "is to be congratulated that today finds you in the midst of your labors, more solicitous of Canada's well-being, and more devoted to the interests of the continent of your long and distinguished political career. Years have served only to increase the respect and admiration of the people of your country, and the prestige of your nation, and the affection of your friends. We are rejoiced that Mrs. Fielding and the members of your family have been spared to share this anniversary with you and with us. It is the fervent wish, indeed it is the prayer of your friends that the beneficent influence of your wide knowledge and rare experience may long continue to be exercised in the moulding of our political opinion and national character."

Evidently Moved. In replying Mr. Fielding showed much emotion. He recalled the day forty years ago when he was elected to public life, touching lightly on his political experience in the interval. There was a tendency, he added, to glorify in imperialism with jingoism. If imperialism meant jingoism and flag-waving, he was not an imperialist. But if imperialism meant reverence for that great institution the British empire, if it meant that one believed the British empire to be one of the greatest institutions in the world, then he was an imperialist. He spoke with feeling of the consideration always shown to him by followers of all parties, and in the name of Mrs. Fielding and his family, as well as in his own name, thanked his colleagues for their gift.

Mr. Fielding's desk was heaped with bouquets of red and white roses when the means were called for the consent at 8 o'clock today. The entry of the minister of finance was the signal for a tremendous outburst of applause in which all parties joined.

Nova Scotia's Tributes. Celebrating the fortieth anniversary of Hon. W. S. Fielding's entry into Canadian politics, Nova Scotia members of the house of commons today presented the finance minister with a bouquet of forty red roses and also with a framed photograph of the "solid sixteen" Liberal members elected on December 6 last. The presentation was made by Hance J. Logan, M.P., for Cumberland.

BODIES WERE TIED TO RAILWAY LINES

Motive for Death of Two Men and Girl is Mystery.

Memphis, Tenn., June 21—Mystery surrounds the motive for the murder of two men and a young woman near Coopers, Tenn., whose bodies were found tied to the tracks of the Southern Railway in the path of the crushing east-bound Memphis special which thundered by just after the bodies had been removed. The woman, who was about twenty-two years old and who is believed to be Velma Parker, of Chattanooga, was dressed in male clothing. Her skull was crushed in. One of the men is thought to be Grady Wallin of Lafayette, Alabama, as letters found in his pockets indicate. The other man has not been identified. The top of his head had been knocked off.

The bodies were taken to Corinth, Miss., for embalming. Two men, believed to have been members of the party, and who are suspected with complicity in the crime, were seen to jump from a freight train at Moscow, Tenn., a short distance from the scene of the triple killing. One man in falling broke his arm. The other escaped. The injured man was brought
