his exit first. Orlando, the courageous and intellectual Italian statesman, who triumphed over intrigue and terror to range his country on the side of freedom and destiny, went next. Wilson, the strange American Sphinx with the smile of gold and the eyes of Bernarck Idealism, is submerged entirely. Venizelos, the Greek Nestor, with the invincible mouth and kindling eyes, who gave his countrymen a place in the great story and the promise of ancient glories restored, has bitten the dust of the arena. The dynamic figures of the German and Austrian statesmen, who launched the holocaust, have become ghosts in the pages of history.

Alone of all the great circle of statesmen who served their nation for good or ill in the war's upheaval, Lloyd George remains erect and virile historically within the ringing amphitheatre of public affairs today. And the white loose locks and quick intelligent eyes of "the little Welsh attorney" seem to defy, with a sneer, the sinister fatality of all his compeers.

Unpleasant Suggestion.

Thinly veiled allusions have recently been made by a very popular, if not a very distinguished, writer to "Court influence" in high politics. It is suggested that the failure to bring the ex-Kaiser and the present "Tino" intrigue at Athens are in some mysterious way, connected with court machinations in London. Anything more unfair and, indeed, ridiculous, could hardly be imagined, but the writer who hints at these canards is merely expressing a feeling that is rather prevalent among the groundlings. The truth is that the political influence of the court has, since Queen Victoria's time fallen away completely, and King Edward's demise saw the very last of it.

The suggestion rest on no firmer foundation than M. Venizelos' assertion that the Allies insisted that his regime, when they supported it against outside influences, should not be "ultra-dynamic," have been laid down it is not easy to say, but possibly the Allied statesmen, the majority of them good Republicans, Bolshevism at the moment. "Tino" is certainly no more persona grata at the British Court than the ex-Kaiser, whose unfriendly relations with our royal family were well-known before we dreamt of the war and his last-known personal message to King George a vindictive injunction to his American dentist, when that gentleman was leaving for home, "If you see my royal cousin in London, kick him well for me!"

M. Cambon's Only English.

The retiring French ambassador, M. Cambon, came to England twenty-two years ago on a mission of peace-making at a time when, over the Fashoda Incident, public opinion in France and England was mutually unduly excited. He has remained to be the doyen of ambassadors, and in that capacity to make public speeches on their behalf on ceremonial occasions, a duty which he undertakes with an eloquence which, even for Frenchmen, is of a high order. Cultured and eloquent in speech is very rare. Curiously enough he has never acquired more of a knowledge of English than is necessary to call a cab. In the case of a man who has for many years been one of the most popular

figures in London I should think this is unique. He has, of course, been met by similar determination on the part of English statesmen.

And His Successor.

M. Cambon goes little into society, and, apart from the official entertainments, the huge building of the French Embassy has, I think, for many years been mainly a centre for people interested in music, of which the ambassador is very fond. The embassy, which is one of the largest and most forbidding private houses in London from the outside, is decorated inside rather like the Quai d'Orsay in Paris, with plenty of red silk and plush and gilt, and a general appearance of being nowhere comfortable to sit down.

M. Cambon's designated successor, the present French ambassador to Paris, is, so far, quite unknown in London. All sorts of names have been mentioned for the post, including Marshal Foch, French governments nowadays, and M. Berthelot, who would have come, I think, if he had not been given the very powerful post of head of the French foreign office.

A Wells House-Warming.

H. G. Wells, as those who read the papers in which he writes will see, has returned from Russia, but not for long. He has to go to America on a lecturing tour on December 29 and will be away till March. In the meantime he
