KILLS SLAYER OF FATHER AFTER 15 YEARS WAITING. Paris, Jan. 3.—Fifteen years ago an Italian named Bonico killed a fellow-countryman named Calogero in Marseilles. He was sentenced to six years' imprisonment, and on his release went to America. He returned to Marseilles the other day and half an hour after landing was shot dead in the street. His assailant, who has been arrested, proved to be the son of Bonico's victim, Calogero, who had sworn vengeance on his father's murderer, which he has now satisfied, after an interval of fifteen years.
