



HYSTERIA IN CHILDREN.

In many cases there is a hereditary tendency to hysteria, which shows itself in early life, and demands active measures of prevention. Care should be taken that school work is not unduly pressed, and that sufficient time is allowed for recreation. A certain amount of steady regular work, provided the child does it without trouble, is beneficial, but there must be no cramming or studying extra for examinations, even for a short period, and a proper amount of rest and sleep is all important, in fact an extra hour in bed every night will often do good. Plenty of time should be spent in the open air, though wildly exciting games are not desirable. Occupations that engage the attention are better than those which allow of too much dreaming or thinking, and the hysterical child should have a simple yet sufficient diet.
