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The resolution was amended by Com. Fowler by striking out the money grant, and adopted in this form.

Com. Flowering moved for a grant of \$100 to employ a trained nurse to visit infected homes and give the necessary instructions.

The bills submitted by the finance committee were all passed with the exception of one for \$204 from Dr. A. T. Thorne of Havelock for medical services rendered in 1911.

Some of the councillors expressed their opinion that the council should be playing more than their share already, and that the Rothsey rate should be increased rather than lowered.
