SCOTT E. MORRELL CASE

Scott E. Morrell, barrister, was before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning, charged with obtaining \$89 under false pretences from Frederick Ramsey, a street car conductor, in February last, by telling him that he had instituted a suit at law for Mr. Ramsey and had issued a writ against the Prudential Life Insurance Company of Canada, and that the case would come on at the first hearing at the next circuit court.
