STORM WASHES UP ON THE REXTON BEACH THOUSANDS OF LOBSTERS

Sackville Post—A strange sight was seen following a recent storm on the New Brunswick coast when thousands of lobsters of all sizes were washed ashore on the north beach at Rexton. For a distance of several hundred yards a reef was formed on the shore of all sorts of fish, including an immense quantity of rock crabs as well as lobsters, which fishermen say are more than all the traps would secure in a season.

Thousands of birds of the sea were on the beach eating the soft parts of the lobsters and leaving only the claws which are strewn about in all directions. No one can recall an event of this kind, and a great many visited the beach to watch the gulls and other birds ravenously enjoying the feast spread for them.

EDMONTON CHOSEN FOR NEXT ASSEMBLY

Presbyterian Campaign Against Mormonism in Canada—The Record Criticized

Ottawa, June 12—Edmonton has been decided on as the place of meeting of the Presbyterian General Assembly in June of next year. The choice, however, is made conditional on favorable rates being secured. Toronto will be the alternative.

Rev. Dr. Forest, of Halifax, criticized the Presbyterian Record. A shaking up, he said, was needed.

They had a male and a female God, and taught that the more marriages and the more children a man had the higher would be his position in heaven. They claim to have 5,000 missionaries to propagate their principles and one little town is said to have sent out thirty. Their strength in Southern Alberta is claimed to be 20,000, and two members are in the legislature.

The next meeting will be taken up tomorrow night.

TECH INSTITUTE GETS \$400,000 UNDER WILL

Boston, June 12—The Massachusetts Institute of Technology gets more than \$400,000 under the will of Mrs. Emma Rogers, widow of a former president of the institution. This fact became known in the probate court when Judge Grant allowed the will. The testatrix made outright gifts of about \$100,000 and the residue was given to the institution.

The judge was informed that Mrs. Rogers left real estate assessed in Boston at \$450,000 and personal property of \$250,000. The reality is probably worth considerably more than the assessed valuation. Her total estate on the figures given is \$700,000. Deducing the \$100,000 she gives outright, the balance at least is around \$600,000.
