INFANT MORTALITY HIGH DURING JULY

Dr. Melvin Reports Twenty Deaths of Children Under Five Years of Age—Twelve Cases of Diphtheria Reported—Warning Against Typhoid

The monthly report drawn up for the information of the public by Dr. G. G. Melvin, health officer, shows an unprecedented large rate of infant mortality during July. Of 38 deaths, more than half, viz, 20, were of children under five years of age and Dr. Melvin points this out as most regrettable in consideration of the fact that proper precautions would have prevented many of the deaths.

JUDGE FORBES THINKS WORKING AGREEMENT IS NOT FEASIBLE

Condemns Judge Ermatinger's Motion for Division of Territory Among Churches—Not Practical at Present

Any working agreement between the churches as a preliminary to organic union is not feasible in the opinion of Judge Forbes, who is a member of the union committee of the Presbyterian body and who has been prominently identified with the question. This opinion was given expressed to His Honor when asked for his views on the proposal of Judge Ermatinger of St. Thomas, Ontario, to move the general synod of the Anglican church at London, Ontario, next month, that a standing committee from both houses be appointed to meet with the authorities of the other churches for the purpose of defining territory or fields of operation.

Committees had previously been appointed and negotiations carried on, Judge Forbes said, with the bishop of Quebec chairman on one side and Principal Patrick on the other, but the question of territory had never been taken up.

"The difficulty about this plan," said His Honor, "is that we have no control over our people and if the churches were not united they would not care to worship in other than their own church. Further, we have no power to go into an arrangement of this nature. We must first find the need of the people and I doubt if the proposed plan is practicable. If the churches do not unite, the people will not I would not be a party to such an agreement."

Judge Ermatinger is well known in this city, having visited his son-in-law, Max, well K. Moorehead, while the latter was U. S. Consul here.
