Three Favor Days' Work Proposal; Two Opposed.—Contracts for Materials Approved.

The Common Council, meeting in committee yesterday afternoon, had under consideration the matter of a contract for digging some 2,000 post holes. The Civic Power Commission had presented a recommendation that the contract be awarded at \$15,975. After long discussion the Mayor moved that the contract be given to Saab & Co. and the motion carried. Commissioners Wigmore and Thornton voting against it. They favored including the erection of the poles and not making separate contracts. The Mayor said he would present on Thursday a recommendation covering the voting of a sum of money which could cover the entire cost.

Recommendations for acceptance by the Commission of tenders for hardware and line materials were approved as follows, without discussion: T. McAvity & Sons, Ltd., \$27,579; H. M. Hopper, \$12,021; Northern Electric Co., Ltd., \$1,899.75; Canadian General Electric Co., Ltd., \$2,740.80.

The Commission also was authorized to proceed with the construction of the base for the sub-station at a cost not to exceed \$1,423. One-third of this will be borne by the Provincial Commission.

A recommendation that the sum of \$10,000 be granted for miscellaneous expenditure for erecting and stringing the wires was not put to vote in view of the attitude of Messrs. Thornton and Wigmore on the post hole proposals. Mr. Frink also expressed his objection to voting money for "miscellaneous" purposes.

JAILED FOR IGNORING COURT. Speeder Gets 20 Days in Workhouse For Not Responding to Summons.

New York, April 24.—To impress upon Thomas Flood, 28 years old who he must appear in court when he receives a summons, Magistrate Norman J. Marsh, in the Traffic Court, sentenced Flood to twenty days in the Workhouse, ten days each time for not appearing on summonses handed to him on Nov. 12 and 14, 1921, respectively.

Flood was charged with speeding in Riverside Drive on both occasions. He pleaded guilty. A warrant was issued for his arrest when he failed to appear in the Traffic Court in the first instance, and a second warrant was issued for his arrest when he failed to appear on the second summons. Since then Warrant Officer John Campbell had searched him continuously until he found him Thursday night.

GREAT NUMBERS FROM FARMS IN U. S. TO CITIES

Washington, April 24.—A decrease of approximately 400,000 persons in the agricultural population of the U. S. in 1922 is reported by the Department of Agriculture, which says its figures were based on a survey of 10,000 representative farms and groups of farms. The estimate, which included not merely workers, but men, women and children living on farms, showed a decrease of about 1.5 per cent. from the 1920 census which placed the agricultural population in rural districts at 31,380,000 persons.

The population movement away from the farm, the department stated, was strongest in the Pacific States, while the percentage of loss was greater than the average for the entire country in the west, south, central and New England states as well as in the Pacific group.

The movement from farms to towns and cities last year was estimated at 1,000,000 persons, offset in part by the shift of approximately 800,000 persons from towns and cities to farms. This left, it was pointed out, a net shift from farms to urban centers of about 1,200,000 persons, or about 3.6 per cent. of the rural agricultural population.

RECRUIT NAVAL VOLUNTEER RESERVE

A St. John Company—Hundred Best Who Apply are to be Accepted.

A St. John Company of the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve is being recruited in the city now for training both here and in Halifax.

Only 100 of the best men applying will be accepted. The obligations are for service either at home or abroad in time of emergency. The recruiting is in charge of Acting Sub-Lieutenant H. Alastair Morrison and enquiries will be received by R. E. Armstrong, secretary of the Board of Trade, or C. B. Allan, of the New Brunswick Tourist Association, both officers of the Naval League of Canada.

It is not necessary that a recruit should have had sea experience. Training will be thoroughly practical, with a view to attaining proficiency in all branches. This applies both to the winter training locally and to the sea training at Halifax.
