Has No Money, Says Report, and Asks Millionaire J. P. Morgan for a Loan

New York, Sept. 19.—A cable to the World from Paris says:—J. Pierpont Morgan has been asked by German financial interests to lead part of the money that may be needed to avert any possible crisis here. Bankers and diplomats say that if the report is true it indicates that Germany has been bluffing, that she cannot go to war if she would, for she has not the money to do so.

AUTOMOBILE BANDITS

MURDER AND KIDNAP

Crecent City, Ills., Sept. 19.—Canadian Press)—Three men, believed to be the Chicago automobile bandits, who surprised while robbing the Bradick farm near here, shot and killed Bradick, seriously wounded his brother Robert and fled, taking Charles Bradick, a cousin of the other two Bradicks with them. They later beat their prisoner unconscious and left him tied to a tree six miles north of the city.

He was found by one of several pursuing posse, who have orders to shoot the bandits on sight.

JOHN KILBURN APPEALS TO VOTERS TO SAVE THE MILLS AND LUMBER INDUSTRY

(Fredericton Mail.)

To the Editor of The Mail:

Dear Sir—If the duty on shingles is not reduced, and reciprocity will remove 20 cents per thousand on this manufactured article alone, and if the American mill owners who manufacture their lumber in St. John, and whose lumber operations are confined to the head of the St. John River in the State of Maine, are not allowed owing to the repeal of the Pike Law to continue as heretofore, I see very strong reasons why these American operators, such as Stetson Cutler & Company, and others will be compelled to shut down their mills in St. John and move their plants up river to Bangor & Aroostook, Maine, because the Bangor & Aroostook Railway is to be extended to the Allagash Falls, and large mills will be erected there.

I am prepared to go on record and I am sure the lumbermen who understand the conditions up river will agree with me, that already we have the fact that fifty million or more of American logs are being today held and manufactured at Van Buren and various other places which formerly were driven and rafted down the river and manufactured and shipped from the port of St. John.

Now if reciprocity does not pass, the outcome will be the stopping of the balance of American logs and the result will be ruinous to the Douglas and Mitchell booms which are contiguous to the City of Fredericton.

The cost per thousand feet of logs from the stump to the mill in St. John is about \$4.00 per thousand. Stop these thirty mil-

CHURCHES ARE IN THIS CASE OVER THE READING OF A WILL

Interesting Hearing is Fixed for Next Month in Chancery—Several Other Cases go Over

The September term of the Chancery Division opened this morning with Justice McLeod presiding. Several of the cases will be taken up in October. Attorney-General vs. St. John Lumber Co., Lodge vs. Calhoun, and Manchester vs. Hassan Paving Co. were stood over until the next term.

A case of much interest is that of Jacob R. Vanwart et al., executors of the will of J. W. Belyea of Queens county, vs. The Diocesan Synod of Fredericton, Methodist churches of New Brunswick, Foreign Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime provinces, New Brunswick School for the Deaf, Margaret E. Belyea, Sophia A. Belyea, and Edna Belyea.

This case involves the construction of a will. It is set down for hearing on October 10. James W. Belyea, the testator, died in 1911 and among other bequests, left money for home and foreign missionary work in Queens county. He left to his wife only the interest on \$12,000 to live on. Geo. H. V. Belyea, appeared for the plaintiff, J. Roy Campbell and M. G. Todd for the Diocesan Synod, E. T. C. Knowles for the Methodist churches, A. A. Wilson, R. O. for the Baptist churches, and school for the Deaf, and J. A. Belyea and J. C. Belyea for other defendants.

W. Weston Allen moved to confirm the report of the master in chancery in the case of Bullock vs. Lingley et al. This was a partition suit and the lands were sold. The report was confirmed.

The case of Jack vs. Kearney stands until October 15. The St. John River Steamship Co. vs. Austin et al. stands until October 11. L. A. Curry appears for the plaintiff, J. B. M. Baxter and Clarence H. Ferguson for Austin, and W. A. Ewing and M. G. Todd for the Crystal Steamship Co. and other defendants.

Miles B. Dixon moved for a decree of partition and sale in the case of Newcombe vs. Bettschen. The lands are situated in Albert county. W. A. Ewing appears for Bettschen.
