Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 8.—The second session of the Maritime Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada was opened in St. Paul's Presbyterian church this morning. Rev. Harry Burns of Millville, N. S., read the opening prayer. The roll call included Rev. J. M. Fisher, of Nova Scotia, who died in the west; Rev. John Fraser of Cape Breton, who has been twenty-six years in the Presbytery of Sydney; Rev. G. Lawson Gordon, M. A., born in Scotland and died in Rediff, Alberta; Rev. Malcolm Ferguson, born at Victoria, B. C., and died at Plaster Rock, N. B.; Rev. John P. McIntosh, born at Pleasant Bay, N. S., died at Lunenburg after only a few years in the ministry; Rev. J. D. McGillivray, born at Pictou, N. S., and died after more than fifty years in the ministry; Rev. Archibald Bowman born in Scotland and educated at Glasgow University, died in Quebec; Rev. Robert Laing, M. A., born in Scotland and died forty-one years in the Presbytery of Halifax. He founded the Halifax Ladies' College in 1867 and became its president in 1890 and this institution would be a lasting monument to his memory. He died in Halifax in July 1919.
