

A Thrilling Rescue

New York, Jan. 28 .- A tale of heroic rescue at sea and a desperate batle to keep a sinking vessel afloat was told todoy when the Empress of Scotland arrived with Captain Aaron Kearley and crew of five of the Kearley and crew of five of the schooner Clintonia, of Belloram, on board. The rescue was effected on Friday. Totaly helpless in a teriffic storm the Clintonia for Halifax, from Fortune Bay, was in a sinking condi-tion when sighted.
