NATURAL GAS CORPORATION TO DRILL AT HERBERT

Reports from Herbert Ferry state that gas drilling operations will actually start in that vicinity in the course of the next few days for the Great West Natural Gas Corporation, the concern that has secured franchise from the cities of Regina, Moose Jaw and Swift Current for supplying gas for domestic and power purposes within a limit of two years.

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Mayor C. F. Gray, who won a signal victory over S. J. Farmer, his labor opponent, with a majority of 3,116, will be in the unenviable position of having to give a casting vote on straight Labor issues.

An actual total of votes cast shows that the citizen candidates polled nearly 6,000 more votes than the Laborites. This is very interesting in view of the fact that next year's light may be waged with the ward system abolished.

Another outstanding feature is that of the fifteen Laborites placed in the field only four were successful.
