The son admitted that the family prayer meeting was held just before Roschel's disappearance. Roschel's body was found hanging in a tree in the woods. It is supposed that he suicided. Some spots of blood on the floor of the house were accounted for by the theory that Roschel was clubbed by his wife or son.

The procession was then formed, the Sheriff leading, the condemned following, the priest and doctors bringing up the rear. O'Rourke walked firmly up the steps to the gallows.

**A Modern Abraham.**  
THE SACRIFICIAL MURDER OF A CALIFORNIA BOY BY HIS FATHER--ARREST OF THE BOY'S MOTHER. (California Paper.) Mrs. John Smith, the wife of the inhuman fiend who butchered his thirteen year old son near Westminster on the 4th of last month was brought to Los Angeles on Wednesday last and placed in the goal to await her trial as accomplice in the murder of her only son. The woman, in personal appearance, is not unprepossessing, and there is nothing in her face to denote absence of the motherly instincts of which she has shown herself to be utterly devoid. As she entered the room, bearing in her arms a pale and sickly-looking infant, the reporter saw before him a woman small in stature, with a round face. She was scantily clad in an old dress, which seemed to be the mockery of an attempt to keep off the cold gusts which now and then came sweeping the goal yard. A crew of a shawl, gathered closely around her frail form and that of her crying babe, added merely to her physical comfort, and formed but another link in the picture which had it not been for her sunken eyes, would have been an impressively sad one.

During the interview which is in substance reproduced below, she would, from time to time, look up into the reporter's face with the fierce flash of desperation in her eyes, and at other times the tears would swell up from long unused springs to flood the face and choke the sound of her voice. Her whole story seemed to be sincere; there was no effort at dissimulation or dissimulation.

"What do you mean? Do you mean to say that the slaying of one of your children did not seem awful to you?" "No; I felt but a little, but when he told me what was going to do, it did seem so terrible. It was only when I saw the boy fall over and a great stream of blood come spurting from the body that I felt how terrible it all was."
