ACCIDENT AT SPRING HILL—A Spring Hill despatch to the Moncton Transcript says: The boiler in J. & W. Atkinson's steam saw mill burst Thursday afternoon making sad havoc among the men gathered there. The engine is not expected to recover from injuries received. Some five others were hurt, not seriously though.

"THE PELTON"—The Norwegian barque Pelton, under command of Capt. J. A. S. E. Gale on the 18th September. Two days after, in lat. 44° 54' N., lon. 42° 43' W., the crew were taken off by the Norwegian barque Aftenstjernen, from Liverpool and landed at St. John on Thursday last.

KILLED ON THE I. C. R.—Joseph Young, a section man engaged on the railway between Bathurst and Newcastle, was run over while attempting to board a wagon at Bathurst station on Thursday last. The wheels of an car passed over his body, breaking his legs and arms and crushing him in frightfully. The man died from injuries at 8 a.m. on Friday. He was 21 years of age.

MUNICIPAL BUSINESS—We hear that Councilor Wood and Mr. Geo. Steables are to run on one ticket for the representation of Newcastle in the Municipal Council; also that Messrs D. Morrison and Joseph McKnight have joined their interests for the same purpose.

In Chatham the indications point to the unopposed return of the present councilors.

A HEAVY LOSS—Mr. Frank Jardine has lost his four wheel dog. A fox, that apparently had the good ability to fly in different directions at the same time undertook to test it the other night. The fox won, but had the generosity to leave the four wheel dog unharmed, and returned to his master's side.

Mr. Jardine says someone has been stealing the *Advocate*.

THE ARMENIAN LECTURER.—Rev. Garald Negaration of Eastern Turkey, lectured at St. John's Church last Thursday evening on the progress of Christian Missions in Armenia. He appeared in the costume of his native country and gave a history of Missionary efforts in his country and a most interesting personal experience in connection therewith.

SHEDDY DEATH.—On Sunday last, just after the beginning of the morning service in St. John's Church, Chatham, Mrs. Hannah Morris, a widow aged 78 years was observed to fall over in her pew. Those near her assisted in carrying her to the vestibule and messengers were despatched for a doctor, but before one could reach the church she was dead. The body was at once removed in a wagon and laid in state in the vestibule until the end of the service that died on Sunday evening at the age of 78.

DEATH OF MRS. BOWSER.—Mrs. Kate Bowser, who has long been known to travel on the North Shore, died at an early hour last Sunday morning, of congestion of the lungs, and was buried on Tuesday afternoon. Few women were better than she in the way of her domestic and kindness of heart. Her numerous deeds of charity were performed in an unostentatious manner and her memory will long be gratefully remembered. Sympathy with the family is very general and few funerals in Chatham have been larger or more marked by tokens of public respect. All the stores being closed along the line of

procession, which embraced all classes in the community.

ENTERTAINMENT AT DAKTOWN.—Our Daktown friends are preparing for a first class entertainment, which is to be held in the public hall at that place on Friday of next week, 21st inst. The programme is to consist of vocal and instrumental music, stump speeches, dialogues and recitations, after which there will be a basket social. The object is to assist the fund for the support of the Methodist church services in that locality, and the preparations being made warrant the belief that the affair will be an unusually attractive one. The managing committee are Messrs. Wm. Munroe, Jr., Wm. J. Letson and Henry Smart.

THIEF TAKEN.—An exciting chase took place on Water Street Chatham last Tuesday, the pursuers being policemen Riggley and the pursued John Whelan, who, with one James McDonald, was accused of robbing a Frenchman on the streets of the city in the afternoon. It was an unusual noise to have the drum beating—unusual to me, anyway. I was disturbed and annoyed by the beating of the drum that night and was not the better of it all night.

CRIMINAL BY MR. THOMSON.—I have lived sixty years in the town and seen a good many criminals; have heard a Chatham band going round the streets playing, never had occasion to put them to rest with a horse; have frequently seen the Salvation Army going round town. When I met them that night near the Methodist Church they ceased off a little but they were singing and shouting.

MR. THOMSON: Were you not pleased with the music?

Witness: I was not. It was not a Salvation man who held my horse. I got a little nervous.

RECORDED.—I was annoyed; never was worse annoyed in my life; I was in danger; I had lost command of the horse; we don't have military bands going round every day. The Salvation Army have got the trick of going round. I have a horse that I can not take out of the stable when the Salvation Army is out.

TO MR. ADAMS.—It is my own horse and is eight years old.

Court here adjourned until 2:30.

COURT RESUMED, pursuant to adjournment.

D. G. Smith, sworn: I reside in Chatham; am a Councilor for the Parish of Chatham and a member of the Police Committee; am the informant in this matter; know defendant.

MR. TWEEDE: Had you a conversation with the defendant?

Witness: I had, yesterday.

MR. ADAM: Objects to evidence of any conversation that took place between witness and defendant since the laying of the information, either for the purpose of settlement of the matter or otherwise.

Witness: Was about to proceed, when Mr. Thompson interposed the question—

Witness: Was the conversation for the purpose of settling the matter or otherwise?

MR. TWEEDE: The objection was overruled.

Witness: The primary object of my holding the conversation with defendant was not to elicit evidence for this suit, but for the purpose of giving me in a course I purposed taking ultimately in reference to defendant. During the conversation however something was said which suggested to my mind the idea of eliciting from defendant evidence on a point that would be useful in the case.

MR. THOMSON: Objects that conversation held for the purpose of effecting a settlement of the case?

Witness: Not by any means.

TO MR. TWEEDE: I said to defendant that I had understood he had not been in the drum since the time it was known that one of the Police Committee had requested the Army not to do so, and that I thought it right to say to him that I was not proceeding in the matter for his future good conduct, as I was merely anxious to carry out the law.

Witness continued: I know that the Salvation Army beats a drum about town.

MR. TWEEDE: What is the effect of the drum-beating on you?

Witness: Sometimes it annoys me, sometimes it interests me and sometimes it annoys me. My observations of it lead me to believe that it causes horses to become restive and unmanageable on the streets. It is a loud noise; jars windows by the vibrations or airwaves it causes. It is, in my opinion, calculated to disturb the inhabitants.

CRIMINAL BY MR. ADAMS.—I have been a policeman for nearly 5 years in Chatham, know the steamer Miramichi and that carries excursionists, noticed the Chatham during the summer. Have not seen them going or returning from the boat. Their drum makes a noise similar to that of the Salvation Army. Have seen several boats on the water. The Army parades four or five nights a week and on Sundays—morning and afternoon. I have not arrested anyone for beating the drum. Have seen the Army on the streets playing and praying. It has been used the last 2 years for the Salvation Army to parade the street and play the drum.

MR. ADAM:—Do you remember the Roman Catholic Bazaar in the Chatham rink last summer?

Witness: I do. I was there, saw the Chatham band going to it one day playing on the street. I don't know whether they had their drum or not.

RECORDED.—Since I have been a policeman there has been no body, excepting the Salvation Army, in the habit of making noise on the street with the drum and singing.

I being after four o'clock and appearing that the case would occupy another day, several reports were made to the Court, the further sitting was postponed until Tuesday, 11th inst., at half past ten a.m.

The hearing of the case was resumed on Tuesday morning, 11th inst., pursuant to adjournment.

MR. FITZPATRICK, sworn: I keep a livery stable in Chatham, have heard the Army's drum-beating on the streets. Its effect on my horses, sometimes, is to scare them. I have had to hold my horses to prevent them from running away when scared by the drum-beating. I had heard the drum-beating once, particularly, but they were scared more than once. I my-

self, can drive all my horses safely when the drum is beating, save one, that one is a horse named Tom in the habit of going around the town when the drum is beating. I'm afraid the drum will make him run away, as it frightens him very much.

CRIMINAL BY MR. ADAMS.—Have been five years in the livery stable business. Have not conversed with either Mr. Twieede or Mr. Smith in reference to this case.

MR. ADAMS continued asking witness questions about the band playing in connection with the R. C. Bazaar and excursions. Witness had refused to hire out the particular horse named in one occasion on account of fearing the drum.

Wm. Delaney, sworn, reside in parish of Chatham, have seen the Salvation Army parading, was once driving Ullock's little pony "Nelly," when the Army was parading. When I came upon them the horse was restless and I couldn't get past without my forcing her to go. I had to sing out to them to stop the music, the drum and to apply to the music to stop. When I went to pass on wheel went on the sidewalk. I was very much annoyed. I think one of the Army came out to hold the horse. When I went home I was afraid to let my horse out to go to the stable.

CRIMINAL BY MR. ADAMS.—I slept quiet that night; the side of the drum I was entitled to was blocked by the music.

LOUIS DICK, sworn: Was subpoenaed in this case, but did not take the subpoena; was arrested under a warrant to give evidence. I'm neither in favor of nor against the Army, remember a child being under the wheels of my wagon one Saturday night about four weeks ago. I had come to Mr. Geo. Hay's that night, the horse came down quietly to the Methodist Church corner. I don't remember who he had difficulty then with the horse because of the Army's noise—the drum beating. I saw who was beating the drum, but I was not in the street when the drum was being beaten. Three boys were running across the street and two got across. I did not know what was going on, but I saw the drum was run over. I saw no other reason for the boy being run over but the restlessness of the horse caused by the noise of the drum.

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
