### THE CLAIMANTS TO THE DRUCE ESTATES

### A Puzzler for Edglish Courts to Solve

Was the Man Who Ran the Little Shop  
the Duke of Portland—Some  
Facts of the Case.

MELBOURNE, Feb. 8.—Mr. George Hollamby Druce, whose case against Lord Howard de Walden as the life owner of estates of the fifth Duke of Portland will probably come on for hearing in England, during the next few months is largely dependent upon the testimony of a lady who states that she was for some years private secretary of the fifth duke at Welbeck Abbey.

The essential facts in this romantic case are that for several years Mrs. Anna Druce, who believed herself to be the widow of the eldest legitimate son of Thomas Charles Druce, of the Baker Street Bazaar, London, made unavailing efforts to compel the Consistory Court to grant her an order to open the grave of her husband's grave in Highgate cemetery. In this grave she alleged was buried not the body of Thomas Druce but a quantity of lead. Druce she said was really the fifth duke of Portland who did not die until 1879. Unfortunately for Mrs. Druce the facts as to the death of Thomas Druce were sworn to by doctors and a housekeeper and the courts refused to grant the order.

The Druce case was just beginning to lose interest when a new claimant appeared in the person of Mrs. George Hollamby Druce, an Australian cas-  
penter. He claimed to take an interest in the Portland claim, inasmuch as he was the eldest son of the eldest son of Thomas Charles Druce by a first marriage with Elizabeth Crick-  
mer.

According to the Hollamby Druce claim this marriage was a runaway match between T. C. Druce, described as a linen draper and a school girl heiress with a fortune of \$75,000. The draper is said to have appeared from nowhere, a handsome young man, with-  
out friends or relatives. For three years he lived with his wife, spending her money freely. In 1859 his wife's fortune having disappeared he desert-  
ed her and her children.

For fifteen years the Druce family at Bury St. Edmunds heard no more have suddenly repented of his desertion and on discovering that the ship on which the father of the present claim-  
ant was serving his apprenticeship was lying in the Thames he went down to Gravesend to see his sixteen-year-  
old son.

Now for the first time the Druce family learned that the missing father was the proprietor of a bazaar in Baker Street. The boy was taken there educated at a naval academy, and again sent to sea. His sister, the au-  
thor of the claimant, was also sent for and lived for many years with her father who now appeared as a gentleman with a residence at Brighton, a hunting box in Leicestershire and a country seat at Hendon. The question the courts are now asked to decide is: Was this man Druce, the owner of the bazaar, grandfather of George Hollamby Druce, really fifth Duke of Portland?

### DISEASE IMPORTED IN FOREIGN GOODS

### French Medical Men Believe the Danger is Real

Germes Arrive, Particularly in Consig-  
ments of Jute and Cloth  
Goods.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—Are the dangers of  
importations from the East exag-  
gerated in a question which is now being  
quite widely discussed in the techni-  
cal and medical press. They were sup-  
posed to have had a great deal to do  
with the spread of the plague in by-  
gone times, and during the last alarm  
of cholera a medical commission was  
appointed to examine into the question  
and pronounced in favor of the adop-  
tion of precautions, such as the disin-  
fection of certain goods from Marseilles.  
Oriental carpets and curtains have  
always been particularly open to sus-  
picion for obvious reasons, and only  
recently the attention of the Academy  
of Medicine has been again drawn to  
this rather important subject. Dr.  
Widal has reported to it two cases of  
bacillary dysentery which proved fatal,  
and are believed to have been caused  
by contact with Japanese hangings;  
and now Dr. Reullinger, who is at the  
head of the Pasteur Institute at Con-  
stantinople, has been sending it an  
elaborate paper in which he reviews the  
question of the possibility of the trans-  
mission of the infectious malarial  
parasites of Oriental origin and dis-  
eases. The learned physician says that  
anyone who is acquainted with the  
habits of the natives of the East, and  
the manner in which this trade is car-  
ried on can feel no surprise at the fact  
that the disease can be introduced. Most  
of the old carpets have already served  
as rugs, quilts and so forth, and owing  
to these and other conditions of  
contamination they are undoubtedly a  
source of danger. The question is being  
asked how this is to be warded off and  
the answer is by means of disinfection.  
Luckily these Oriental goods, un-  
like European hangings and carpets,  
as a rule, lend themselves easily to it.  
With the exception of the Egyptian  
jute and of some Smyrna products  
which are dyed with aniline they can  
be washed with excellent results, says  
Dr. Reullinger who moreover considers  
that it ought not to be difficult to find  
an antiseptic which would destroy the  
germs without damaging the stuff. An  
other remedy is the insertion of these  
goods for disinfection into a drying  
stove at a temperature of 100° C.  
Contingents which unlike the washing  
process which tones down the colors,  
brings them out. Thus quite apart from  
the danger to health it is urged  
it is possible to improve the appear-  
ance of the rugs and carpets.

### BARONESS, USED AS SPY, UNPAID BY EMPLOYERS

Former Barmaid and Actress Boasts of  
Being at Home in Austrian  
Court.

VIENNA, Feb. 8.—The Baroness  
Schonberger, the Hungarian beauty  
who was used by the Hun-  
garian Minister of Justice, to spy on  
the Emperor Francis Joseph to find out  
his views on Hungarian affairs, has  
given to the Budapest newspapers.

She claims to have brought about  
the famous audience of M. Kossuth  
with the Emperor, ending with the  
constitutional struggle between Hun-  
garians and the crown. She says:  
"At this time I was as much at home  
in the Emperor's palace as in my  
own house. My real protector at court  
was the lord chamberlain, Prince  
Lichtenstein, and not Count Paar,  
whose name was given to spur the  
chamberlain."

The Baroness declares that in spite  
of the great political events which  
she rendered and the expenses to which  
she was put, which nearly ruined her,  
the Hungarians' political views never paid  
her the money which they had prom-  
ised.

The Vienna newspapers have spoken  
slightly of the personal charms of  
the Baroness, who travelled from Bud-  
apest last night and presented herself  
at their offices to prove that they had  
been misinformed, and also at the  
same time to satisfy them that she was  
really familiar with prominent mem-  
bers of the court, a fact on which doubt  
had been cast.

The Baroness has a varied past. Af-  
ter being barmaid, actress and profes-  
sional beauty, she married Baron Sch-  
onberger, a Hungarian ex-officer, for  
his title. The baron, after being dis-  
missed from the army, became a cab-  
man in Budapest.
