STRINGENT SYSTEM OF INSPECTION ADOPTED

Every Boat and Train From the United States Now Watched and Undesirables Turned Back.

There have been occasional paragraphs of late in Maine papers with regard to persons bound from the United States to Canada, who have been turned back at the border. This is accounted for by the completion of a system of inspection arranged by the Canadian Immigration Department, and which is now about perfected. Under the new plan every boat and train from the United States is watched by Canadian officials. Men are stationed at some of the points of departure and in other cases at the ports of landing. An inspector meets every steamer of the Eastern line on arrival at St. John, and no passegers are permitted to land until he has seen them. Mr. J. V. Lantahum is in charge of this branch of the work, and Mr. Perley Lunney his assistant in the winter months, is stationed in New York State. Another officer is at Vancebero and in fact right from North Sydney to Victoria there are scores of officers on guard who turn back all undesirable characters. This means that the summer is just as busy as the winter for the immigration staff at St. John. The value of the work being done under this system is seen in the number of persons who are not permitted to enter Canada.


